Sealed proposals, addressed to the undersigned, will be received by the Board of Trustees of School District No. 1, of Kershaw County, the State of South Carolina, until 11 o'clock, A. M., Tuesday, August 24th, 1948, at which time said proposals will be publicly opened at the offices of Superintendent of Schools, in the Town of Camden, S. C., for the purchase of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars of General Obligation Bonds of said School District. The said bonds bear date the 1st day of September, A. D. 1948, are in denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered from 1 to 50, inclusive, and mature in numerical order in annual series or instalments as follows:
5,000.00 on September 1st, in each of the years 1949 to 1958, inclusive.
Said bonds will bear interest at a rate or rates to be named by the bidder, payable annually on September 1st of each year; both principal and interest will be payable in such coin or currency of the United States of America as is on the date of payment legal tender for the payment of public and private debts at the principal office of The Chase National Bank of the City of New York, in the City of New York, State of New York.
Bidders are invited to name the rate or rates of interest which the bonds are to bear and they will be awarded to the bidder offering to take them at the lowest interest cost at a price not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery. Interest cost will be determined by deducting premium from the aggregate of interest on the bonds until their respective maturities. The right is reserved to reject any and all proposals, and if all bids are rejected, said bonds will be readvertised in this publication.
The bonds will be general obligation bonds of School District No. 1, of Kershaw County, the State of South Carolina, payable, as to both principal and interest, from an ad valorem tax upon all taxable property in said School District, without limit as to rate or amount. Purchasers will be furnished with the printed bonds and an opinion on their validity by Huger Sinker, Esq., Attorney at Law, Charleston, S. C.
Each bid should be enclosed in a sealed envelope and marked "Proposal for School District No. 1, Kershaw County, General Obligation Bonds" and be directed to the undersigned, and must be accompanied by cash or a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company for \$1,500.00, payable to the Treasurer of Kershaw County, which may, at the option of the School District, be retained as liquidated damages if successful bidder shall fail to comply with his bid.
The bonds will be delivered to the purchasers at Camden, S. C., within forty-five days after the occasion of their award.

AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE OFFICE OF CITY MANAGER IN THE CITY OF CAMDEN, S. C., AND PROVIDING FOR HIS POWERS AND DUTIES: BE IT ORDAINED by the Commission of Camden:
Section 1. Creating of Office. The office of city manager is hereby created.
Section 2. Appointment of City Manager. The city manager shall be appointed by a majority vote of the city commission for an indefinite term. The city manager shall be chosen by the council solely on the basis of his executive and administrative qualifications with special reference to his actual experience in or his knowledge of accepted practice in respect to the duties of his office hereinafter set forth. At the time of his appointment he need not be a resident of the city or the state, but during his tenure of office he shall reside within the city. No commissioner shall receive such appointment during the term for which he shall have been elected nor within one year after the expiration of his term.
Section 3. Removal of City Manager. The city manager may be removed by the Commission by a majority vote of its members. The manager may, within four (4) days, demand written charges or a written statement of the reasons for removal which the commissioners shall furnish to the manager with in ten (10) days after the filing of such request. During this period the manager may be suspended from office with pay. The action of the commission in removing the manager shall be final.
Section 4. Powers and Duties of City Manager. The city manager shall be the executive officer and head of the administrative branch of the city. He shall be responsible to the city commission for the proper administration of all affairs of the city, and to that end, subject to the personnel provisions of the city charter, he shall have power and shall be required to:
A. Appoint and, when necessary for the good of the service, suspend or remove all officers and employees of the city except as otherwise provided by the city charter or law, and except as he may authorize the head of a department or office to appoint, suspend, or remove subordinates in such department or office.
B. Prepare the budget annually and submit it to the commission and be responsible for its administration after adoption.
C. Prepare and submit to the commission as of the end of the fiscal year a complete report on the financial and administrative activities of the city for the preceding year.
D. Keep the commission advised of the financial condition and future needs of the city, and make such recommendations as he may deem desirable.
E. Recommend to the governing body the salaries to be paid each appointive officer and subordinate employee of the city.
F. Recommend to the governing body, in writing, from time to time, for adoption, such measures as he may deem necessary or expedient.
G. Consolidate or combine offices, positions, departments or units under his jurisdiction, with the approval of the commission. The city manager may be the head of one or more departments.
H. Attend all meetings of the city commission unless excused therefrom by the commission, except when his removal is under consideration by the commission. The manager shall have the privilege of taking part in the discussion of all matters coming before the commission. The manager shall be entitled to notice of all meetings, regular and special, of the commission.
I. Purchase all materials, supplies, or equipment, for which funds are provided in the budget, but he may not purchase any item which exceeds any budget appropriation until the commission has increased the appropriation provided that for purchases of more than \$1000, except for emergency replacement of essential equipment, the manager shall be required to receive sealed or competitive bids and shall present such bids to the commission for approval or rejection. He may let contracts not in excess of \$1000 necessary in the operation or maintenance of city services when sufficient funds for such purposes have been appropriated in the budget, but the city commission shall let all contracts for more than \$1000, all contracts for new construction and all contracts which cannot be consummated with funds provided in the current budget. The manager shall advise the commission as to whether or not any contract offered is desirable, or which of several contracts offered is most desirable for the city. The manager may issue such rules and regulations governing requisitions and the transaction of the business of purchasing between himself as purchasing agent and the heads of the departments, officers, and employees of the city as the governing body may approve.
J. See that all laws and ordinances are duly enforced.
K. Make investigations into the affairs of the city or any department or division thereof. Investigate all complaints in relation to matters concerning the administration of the government of the city, and in regard to services maintained by the public utilities in the city, and see that all franchises, permits, and privileges granted by the city are faithfully observed.
L. Devote his entire time to the discharge of his official duties.
M. Perform such other duties as may be required of him by the commission, not inconsistent with the city charter, law or ordinance.
Section 5. Commission Not to Interfere with Appointments on Removals. Individual members of the commission shall not direct or request the appointment of any person to, or his removal from, office by the city manager or by any of his subordinates, or in any manner attempt to dictate the appointment or removal of officers and employees in the administrative service of the city. Except for the purpose of inquiry, commissioners shall deal with the administrative service solely through the city manager and no commissioner shall give orders to any subordinate of the city manager, other than the city manager, either publicly or privately.
Section 6. Emergencies. In case of accidents or other circumstances creating an emergency, the governing body, or the city manager, with the consent of the governing body, may, for the purpose of repairing damages caused by said accident or emergency, make purchases for the purpose of repairing damages. Such purchases shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the city charter, and the necessary emergency and the necessity for such action, together with a itemized account for all expenditures.
Section 7. Bond. The city manager shall furnish a surety bond in the sum of \$10,000.00 to be approved by the commission, and to be conditioned on the faithful performance of his duties. The premium of the bond shall be paid by the city.
Section 8. Compensation. The city manager shall receive compensation as the commission shall fix from time to time by ordinance or resolution.
Section 9. Vacancy. Any vacancy in the office of city manager shall be filled within sixty (60) days after the effective date of such vacancy.
Section 10. Saving Clauses. Any section, subsection, or clause, or phrase of an ordinance is for any reason to be invalid, such decision or decisions shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the ordinance. All ordinances of the city prescribing the duties of departments shall remain in force and effect except in so far as they conflict with the provisions of this ordinance in which case the provisions of this ordinance shall govern.
