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Baum Explains Awards Offered In Big Contest

David H. Baum, local representative of Mutual of Omaha, explained today two national safety and health awards created by his company to a group of local civic officials.

The two awards, the Dr. C. C. Criss Award for outstanding contributions in health and safety, and the national Oratorical Contest for high school juniors and seniors were explained to a group of local officials which included C. T. Baldwin, high school principal; Marion Heyman, head of the Kershaw County Red Cross; Dr. A. W. Humphries, county health officer; Bates Littlejohn, president of the local Lions club, and Austin Sheheen, of the safety committee of the Jaycees.

Mr. Baum explained that the winner of the Dr. Criss Award, selected by a group of distinguished Americans, will receive a gold medal and a cash prize of \$10,000.

The national winner of the high school Oratorical Contest will receive a cash prize of \$4,000, Mr. Baum explained. The contest produces the winner will receive a special cash prize of \$1,000, Mr. Baum added.

These two awards have been created by Mutual of Omaha to reduce accidents both in the home and on the highways, Mr. Baum said.

There will be local, state, six regional and finally the national competition in the Oratorical Contest with the subject being "Live Safely; Live Happily," Mr. Baum explained.

Mr. Baldwin, after the discussion endorsed the Oratorical Contest and stated junior and senior high school students here would be encouraged to participate.

Dr. Criss Award is a great incentive for medical research," commented Dr. Humphries.

"Mutual of Omaha is to be congratulated on their public service health and safety programs," said Austin Sheheen, of the Safety Council, Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Lions Club President H. B. Littlejohn and Red Cross Chairman Marion H. Heyman voiced their appreciation of the two awards.

Seaboard To Cut Passenger Fares

The first passenger fare reductions in a decade were announced yesterday by the Seaboard Railroad, which said that effective May 1 it would sell round trip coach tickets between all points on its lines and Washington on the basis of a fare and a half.

Present round trip rail fares allow only a 10 per cent reduction for the round trip.

J. L. Carter, assistant general passenger of the Seaboard, in announcing the new rates, cited some examples of how the fares would benefit the traveling public.

Between Columbia and Washington: Present round trip rate, \$30.05 in Pullmans and \$21.50 in coaches; new rate, \$25.05 in Pullmans and \$17.90 in coaches. The 15 per cent federal tax on railroad tickets must be added to all railroad fares.

Between Columbia and Miami: Present round trip rate, \$42.85 in Pullmans and \$33.58 in coaches; new rate, \$34.70 in Pullmans and \$24.35 in coaches.

Mr. Carter said the new tickets, which will have a 30-day return limit, would be on sale daily from May 1 to Nov. 15 and coach rates would apply to all Seaboard points. Unrestricted tickets good in Pullman cars will not be sold between certain points west of Hamlet, the announcement said.

The Seaboard operates four New York-Florida streamliners daily through Columbia during the summer season, when the new fares will apply, besides other trains which do local work. The new tickets will be good on all trains including the Silver Meteor, the Silver Star, etc.

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Col. J. N. Ancrum Retired Tuesday

Col. James N. Ancrum, a native of Camden, retired Tuesday at a ceremony held at the Mississippi Military District, Jackson, Miss., where he was stationed as executive officer. Colonel Ancrum served 22 years in the army, joining in 1918. He received his commission that same year after attending Officer's Training Camp.

The 60-year-old colonel is the third member in his family to retire from the service. One brother retired from the navy as a captain and another from the Marines as a colonel.

During his 22 years of service, he spent 10 years overseas with the greater part of this time in the Pacific. Colonel Ancrum was stationed in the Philippines for several years and also in the Hawaiian Division from 1930 to 1932, in the Panama Canal Zone from 1932 to 1940. While he was stationed in Japan from 1940 to 1949, he served as senior judge of all provost courts in Southern Honshu and Island of Shikoku. It was after his return to the states from his Japan duty that the colonel was assigned as executive officer at the Mississippi Military District in Jackson, Miss., May, 1949.

Colonel Ancrum wears the following decorations: World War II Victory Medal, Army of Occupation Medal, Army Commendation Ribbon, American Defense Medal and the American Theatre Ribbon.

Mrs. Ancrum, the former Josephine Ruck of Dallas, Texas, who was also present at the ceremony, happily stated, "Now that the Colonel and I have retired, we plan to make our home in Winter Park, Fla."

Col. Stuart MacDonald, commanding officer of the Mississippi Military District presented Colonel Ancrum with a Certificate of Achievement signed by Lieut. Gen. Alvin C. Gillem, commanding general of the Third Army Headquarters.

Colonel Ancrum was born in Camden, and is the son of the late William and Anna Calhoun Ancrum. He graduated from Camden High School and later graduated from Clemson College with honors.

He returned from Japan several months ago, where he was stationed for four years.
