Open Annual \$6,000 Contest of Junior Vegetable Growers

Opening of the 1950 production-marketing contest of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association is announced by Leon O. Clayton of Clemson Agricultural college, who is state 4-H Club leader and state chairman for the NJVGA. The contest offers teen-age tillers of the soil more than 200 agricultural scholarships and awards for doing a superior job of growing and marketing vegetables.

In announcing the association's tenth annual contest, Clayton pointed out that all Palmetto State boys and girls from 12 through 21 are eligible to compete for the \$6,000 in awards A&P Food Stores provides for this project each year. South Carolina youths won one sectional championship and four state awards in the 1949 contest.

Clayton explained that the contest is essentially an educational program designed to further the use of more modern, efficient and profitable methods of growing and selling vegetables.

"This project plays a vital part in spreading knowledge of scientific agricultural developments," he said, "and with a record 150,000,000 population eating about 15 per cent more than in pre-war years, its importance cannot be over-emphasized."

Those junior growers interested in joining the NJVGA will find it easy to do so. Local 4-H Club leaders, county agents, instructors in vocational agriculture, extension workers of the USDA, and youth leaders of National Grange chapters are all cooperating with the association in enrolling members. Youths may also join by writing directly to Clayton at Clemson. A. D. Schilleter of the extension horticultural department and Miss Sally Pierce of the extension conservation department at Clemson are also taking an active part in the state NJVGA program.

In addition to the production-marketing contest, the 1950 program will again include the annual demonstration contest, in which individuals or teams compete in demonstrating new methods of planting, cultivating, preparing or marketing vegetables. Journeys to the annual NJVGA convention for winners of state contests, and cash awards to top performers in the national finals, are offered by the W. Atlee Burpee Seed Company for this event.

South Carolina winners in the 1949 production-marketing contest were: Betty Williams of Sumter, who won a \$100 sectional championship; Lavenia R. Weir, Chesapeake; Betty Jo Bolt, Anderson; Marie Brunson, Mayesville, and Bertha Eloise Cromer of Williamstown, who won state awards.
