The Crop Outlook.—No one in the south can well be dejected and discouraged if he will study the crop reports; for they are eminently satisfactory, both as to food and to cash crops. The wheat crop was an average one, and only a small percentage of it was lost during the rains of the harvest period; the oat crop was a good one, and the corn crop will almost certainly be something glorious. There will be an abundance of corn from the Gulf to the furthest bounds of the southern country. The recent general rains have removed all doubt on that score. We will buy some meat from the north-west, and some flour, but very little, if any, corn.

The cotton or cash crop is promising. The Egyptian crop is not doing well, and the short crop of last summer leaves the world in a condition to consume a good average crop. The south will supply such a crop beyond a reasonable doubt. There has been very dry weather in Texas, in nearly all of the states the plant is a little late, and in Georgia it is perhaps under-sized, but from all sections come reports of clean fields, with plenty of blooms and fruit. The indications, in other words, are that the south will raise just about the amount that a naked world will need. Neither will the crop be an enormous one, nor will the price be below the cost of production. The happy mean seems to have been hit this year, barring, of course, a disastrous raid of the worms or an early frost.

Under such circumstances the people of the south can well afford to laugh at the contortions of the New York financiers. While we may not be strictly independent, we are not so dependent as some of our long-faced friends seem to think we are. Men that have cotton to sell and no corn to buy come as near enjoying the bliss of independence as people can in this complicated world.

How Mrs. GREELY MET HER HUSBAND.—The following description is given by the Baltimore American of the meeting at Portsmouth, N. H., on Friday of Lieut. and Mrs. Greely after the former had returned from five years of burial in the Arctic:

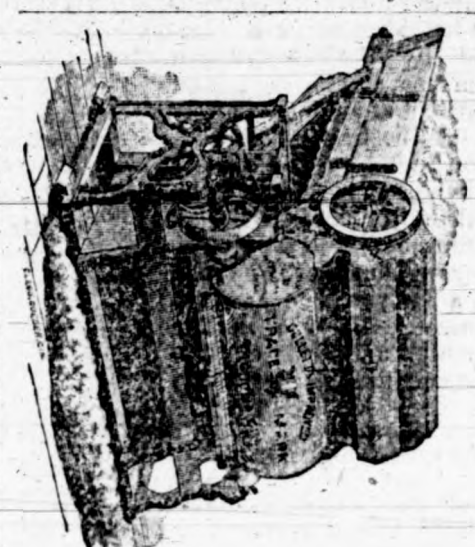
As the lady passed down the comparison-way to the barge she walked with a firm tread, and showed no signs of emotion other than blushing her lips lightly clutching her hands. Lieutenant Greely had not been informed that his wife was about to come on board the Thetis, and a few moments before her arrival in conversation with Commander Schley the hero said he did not expect to see her to-day, as she probably had not been able to reach there so soon. When the Secretary's barge was seen to leave the Tennessee with Mrs. Greely and her two brothers Commander Schley said to Lieutenant Greely, "Lieutenant, I would like to see you in my cabin a few moments." Commander Schley entertained Lieut. Greely in conversation about "Arctic matter until a peculiar signal was given on a boatman's whistle to indicate that Mrs. Greely was on board and ready to meet her husband. Now, the lady trembled in every limb; her breath came in gasps, and her whole frame shook with emotion. With trembling steps she went to the cabin door, and just at the instant she entered Commander Schley left the room, leaving the long separated couple alone. Lieut. Greely was sitting with his back to the door, but when Commander Schley's abruptly left him he turned, and at the same instant saw his wife enter. With a loud cry, that was more like a gigantic sob half smothered, Lieut. Greely bounded from the chair with eyes gleaming in joy at the sight that gladdened them. Mrs. Greely, tall, dark and stately, sprang forward to meet her husband, crying: "Arthur, Arthur home!" After Mr. and Mrs. Greely had been alone for twenty minutes her brothers were called in, and cordially and tearfully greeted their brother-in-law. It was noticeable on board the Thetis that everybody shed tears when Mrs. Greely entered the cabin where her husband was. Late in the afternoon the mother of Lieut. Greely came from Newburyport, and was taken at once on board the Tennessee. Shortly after she was put in the Secretary's barge and taken on board the Thetis. When she arrived there Mr. and Mrs. Greely and the latter's brothers were seated in Commander Schley's cabin, alternately crying, laughing and embracing. An instant before the Lieutenant's mother entered the cabin, Commander Schley stepped to the door, and said: "Lieutenant your mother is here." Mrs. Greely then entered, and threw her arms around her son's neck, saying only, "My son!" Lieutenant Greely spoke no word save "Mother!" but in his tone and expression there was a world of tenderness. Clasping his mother in his arms, the Lieutenant did nothing else but sob, while the mother cried like a child.
