sons originate either from contested rights, or from injuries received. To preserve one's rights is a duty, while safety and well-being forbid submitting to injury. In fulfilling these duties to one's self, to be mindted of the rights of and duties to others furnishes the maxims of common and statute law for terminating disputes between parties.

The law of nature, as well as the dietates of sound practical policy, recommend peace, concord and charity between fellow-men; that the gentlest methods should be tried by contending parties in settling their differences. To relinquish a just subject of complaint, recede from his right, or forget an injury, is the privilege of every one. Prudence, if no more generous motive, may discover occasions for such amicable accommoto it, without nicely deciding the justice of jarring protensions, may point to a compromise-how far to recede, or how much to indemnify, for a peaceable termination. Mediation the interposition of a common friend, a conciliator and not should incline him to rigid justice, but whose prudence and address should on it, may lead to the same result.
