The sugar cane crop in this County will be the best in quality and largest in quantity that has ever been made. Canes that have matured twenty-two joints are common on good lands. The average yield of syrup per acre will be three hundred gallons. It is said that children who are permitted to "chew" cane freely during the fall are never troubled with chill and fever. Before the crops are ground up is the time for people who have not planted to secure seed cane for the next year.

**THE FOREMOST FARMER.**—Mr. W. J. Martin, so since astute as a mountaineer, is equally so as an agriculturist. Last spring he prepared and planted in corn acre of land from which he had harvested a crop of rice. It was sandy soil twelve feet to the clay. He gave it two ploughings and one hoing. By actual measurement he has gathered sixty bushels of good sound corn, and has moreover saved enough pindar and peavines from the acre to winter a cow.

### SCENE III.—On Friday Trial Justice

Patterson held a preliminary examination in the case of the State against Messrs. W. H. Kittrell and S. F. Ray, charged with the killing of Gus Highwater, who died in jail of wounds received in resisting arrest. The warrant for their apprehension was issued upon the affidavit of Jacob Lee, colored, an uncle of the deceased, Jas. E. Davis, Esq., represented the State and W. R. Kelly, Esq., appeared for the accused.

After hearing the evidence of the State's witnesses and argument of the attorneys Justice Patterson held that the State had completely failed to make out a case of murder, and accordingly admitted Kittrell, Kittrell and Ray to bail in the sum of one and three thousand dollars respectively, to answer to the charge of manslaughter, if a true bill should be found against them at the next term of court. They readily gave bond and were discharged. The position taken by Attorney Kelly and sustained by the court were new and without precedent in practice but are held to be good law by the best local legal talent.
