## Great Poultry Exhibit at Tri-State Exhibition

### Plans Laid for 2,000 Birds at Largest Show in the Southeast; Silver Trophy Will Be Awarded for Brown Leghorns and Barred Rocks.

Savannah has realized the importance of the Turner County Plan of the dairy cow, hog and chicken and since the late Geo. H. Betts, originator of this idea, was in Savannah several months ago, when he spoke before a large gathering of the Savannah Board of Trade, much interest has been manifested in poultry raising. The Chatham County Poultry and Pigeon Association will have full management of the poultry show at the Savannah Tri-State Exposition, October 27-November 3, and this body has been given an exclusive use of the Johnson building to display the birds. Judge A. B. Moore, president of the poultry and pigeon association, who is a recognized poultry fancier in Southeast Georgia, has made preparations to increase the membership to 2,000 breeders and thereby establish a large reserve to be spent in prizes for the coming show. The entries will not be limited to local (that is, this section) breeders, and because of this letters requesting information about the details of the show have been coming in regularly.

The president of the Rhode Island Red Club of Georgia, Mrs. T. U. Butts, has offered a silver cup to the poultry breeder, both of utility and fancy strains, who has the best display of Brown Leghorns and Barred Rocks at the Tri-State Exposition. This makes evident what interest is being taken in the poultry show and certainly the trophy will do much to arouse the interest of chicken fanciers in the three states. The cup will be awarded without any other restrictions. There is keen interest in these varieties, and it is believed that more birds will be entered from these breeds than was exhibited in the whole show last year. Co-operation of many poultry clubs has been assured and the Georgia Red Club has already indicated that more than three hundred birds from that association will be shipped to Savannah, October 27. G. C. Smith, secretary of the club, has pledged the support of his body. F. L. Cox, of Jonesboro, in a recent letter, said that he will send a large portion of his flock to Savannah also. Notwithstanding this encouragement from breeders outside of Savannah, the Chatham County Poultry and Pigeon Association is straining every effort to enter a larger number of birds than will be received from other organizations. Efforts are being made to have national judges at Savannah to pass upon the birds. At a late meeting of the Chatham Association, plans were discussed for engaging Harry Stone, secretary of the National Pigeon Association, to select the winners in the pigeon department. Other poultry experts are under consideration, and it is quite probable that they will come to Savannah as the Tri-State Exposition follows in the wake of several fairs in this section, this year, giving an opportunity to get many exhibitors from these fairs and also their judges.

## Purebred Dairy and Beef Cattle for Livestock Show

### Savannah Tri-State Exposition Expects 200 Head of Cattle This Year; Dairy Club Work Doing Much to Raise the Cattle Standard in This Section.

Cattle breeders with some of the largest and best herds of dairy and beef cows will arrive in Savannah, October 27, to enter their animals in the live stock exhibition of the Tri-State Exposition. The entrants will come from a wide range, many of them surpassing the distances traveled last year by the exhibitors who came from Indiana, Iowa and Kentucky. The livestock sheds will be filled to capacity with many heads of cattle this year from the state of Georgia, also.

Dairy club work among the boys in this section as well as among the farmers has done much to increase the interest taken to raise better milk and beef cattle. Many fine herds of purebred stock have been built up in this district. The success that has come from this has given the owners much encouragement and not a few have made reservations for their stock at the Tri-State Exposition this year. Older breeds will find much competition because of this condition, this season.

The Department of Agriculture of Georgia has also done much to assist the farmers in raising the standard of their cattle. It is known that

in the entire country there are 4,000 children enrolled in dairy club work. Quite a large number of these are from Georgia. It is estimated that the outlay in this membership represents \$50,000.

The fallacy of wasting efforts in trying to produce high grade milk and cream, as well as butter and cheese, from scrub cattle, has become recognized by the average farmer, and the dairy-club work has registered its biggest benefit in proving the profit in raising more pure-bred cattle and fewer of the ordinary strains.

With scores of exhibitors who brought their herds to Savannah last year, and the many newcomers, the Tri-State Exposition will have this department on a par with the largest. To give those who have traveled through this section stopping at all the large fairs an opportunity to get their entry papers in at the last minute, the closing date for the livestock department has been placed at October 25. The premium list will be approximately \$4,500, the same amount as last year. Preparations are already being made to house 200 head of cattle.

<b>WEATHER PROPHECY SEES COLD WEATHER AND SNOW</b>	
Lowest Temperatures Since 1918 Predicted for This Winter.	
"The Southeastern States will experience during the coming winter the lowest temperatures since the remarkably cold period of December, 1917, and January, 1918," said W. P. Houseal, the Dutch Weather Prophet, yesterday. "We are entering the 35 year period of meteorological conditions when the weather pendulum begins to swing back the other way in a very decided manner. It happens now that the pendulum is swinging back to conditions similar to those of the '80s, when this section experienced its first daytime blizzard which the generation at that time had seen and the "oldest inhabitant" remembered that had occurred in previous winters. In December, 1884, the Dutch Prophet saw a field of oats turn black from the effects of the blizzard one afternoon—perfectly green at 2 o'clock and as black as one's hat within two hours. The word blizzard was not in use in this section before that date.	
"Along with the cold winter this year will come five snows south and east of the Blue Ridge. One of these snows at least has the promise of being of heavy precipitation and wide extent, and the latter condition, it is expected, will take in Columbia. I give a large clientele of young folk that abundant promise.	
"Another condition of the winter will be no lack of rain. Precipitation will be at least normal with the promise of exceeding that limit with the inclusion of spring weather in the category.	
"Indications at this date show frost of severe form to make it the killing variety along between November 3 and 10."—The State.
