CITY FATHERS REJECT CONTRACT OF EDISTO PUBLIC SERVICE CORP.

The Denmark company has a contract with a power company in Augusta to furnish them with current, which will be supplied to Blackville, Williston and other towns in tais section under contracts made with them some time ago. A power line is being constructed from Augusta to Williston to supply the "juice."


