\$100,000.00 DAMAGE SUIT IN COMMON PLEAS COURT

THREE OTHER BIG CASES ARE PENDING

Mrs. Mary O. Youngblood Brings Suit for Death of Her Husband in Wreck.

The Court of Common Pleas, with Judge W. H. Townsend, of Columbia, presiding, convened here Monday morning...

Two cases were disposed of Monday, the first being that of B. M. Jenkins, Jr., vs. the Southern Railway Co., a suit for \$7,000 alleged damages for refusal by the defendant to ship cantaloupes without payment of freight in advance.

A case that is attracting considerable attention is that of Mary O. Youngblood, Adm., vs. Southern Railway Co. This is a suit under the federal employer's liability act for \$100,000 damages for the death of the plaintiff's husband, G. C. Youngblood, who was killed in a railroad wreck near Orangeburg several months ago.

Two similar actions, involving suits for \$50,000 and \$100,000 damages are also pending in the case of Dantzler vs. Southern Railway Co., for the death of the engineer, which occurred in the same wreck.
