### **RURAL FREE DELIVERY.** '

The Postmaster General's report, which has just been issued, lays much stress on the free delivery of mails in the country, and he goes on to say that the system has passed the experimental stage and has justified the claims of its promoters. but they were adopted by a rising He adds: "How' far? the system shall be extended is submitted for the determination of Congress, with a full presentation of the facts upon which to base a conclusion." The service has been introduced into forty States and one territory, the benefits of the system have been extended to about 180,000 people, and

the annual average cost is only \$4 cents per capita. From this it would appear that the system has had a fair trial under all conditions and circumstances and that its cost is reasonable. The report also shows that free delivery has also increased postal receipts, and many deliveries are self-supporting.

This matter will of course come up for concideration by Congress, and will, we are sure, have the sup port of Sonth Carolinian's Senators and Congressmen, as it should. Wherever the rural free delivery has been put into operation in this State. it has been uniformly successful, and our people appear to be highly pleased.
