BRITISH HONOR
MANY AMERICANS

Washington, March 13.—Sixty-six American army medical officers and men have been decorated by the British government for bravery and distinguished service in the war, Surgeon General Ireland was advised by the British war office.

Maj. Emanuel Goldstein of New York City and Capt. G. P. O'Malley, Cleveland, were made honorary companions of the Distinguished Service Order, and 49 captains and first lieutenants were awarded the military cross. The distinguished conduct medal and military medal of Great Britain was conferred upon 15 enlisted men.

The officers awarded the military cross include Lieuts. Louis W. Desprez, Memphis, Tenn.; Royz A. Douglas, Nashville, Tenn.; Lawrence B. Farrier, Mobile, Ala.; Roy G. Giles, Belton, Texas; Allen G. Heard, Galveston, Texas; William G. Milholland, New Orleans; Daniel J. Murphy, New Orleans; Edward L. Patterson, Barnwell, S. C.; Angus J. Smith, Greenville, Fla.; Fred Oscar Stone, Maynardville, Tenn.; and Roy L. Vineyard, Americo, Texas.

The bar to the military cross was awarded to three lieutenants, one of whom is Lawrence B. Farrier of Mobile, Ala.

Enlisted men receiving the distinguished conduct medals included James K. Faison, One Hundred and Eighteenth Infantry.

Men receiving the military medal included William H. Coble, Ambulance Company One Hundred and Eighteen; William J. Evans, Dillon, S. C.; Edward D. Jones, Ambulance Company One Hundred and Eighteen; William Franklin Jones, Abbeville, S. C.; Herman W. Kenner, Ambulance Company One Hundred and Eighteen; Charles B. Logan, Headquarters One Hundred and Fifth Sanitary Train; Donald Mac Kay, One Hundred and Second Sanitary Train; Harold P. Malley, Sanitary Detachment, One Hundred and Seventh Infantry; Usher Manheim, One Hundred and Second Sanitary Train; Clyde E. Parazine, Field Hospital No. 118; Robert C. Rogers, Ambulance Company One Hundred and Eighteen; Cecil Trammell, Ambulance Company One Hundred and Eighteen.

Most of the units mentioned are parts of the Thirtieth Division.

RAILROADS ADOPT
BUREAU OF SAFETY

Newspapers and Ministers Asked to Cooperate in the Movement.

The following letter has been received by The Times, and by the ministers of Union:

Gentlemen:
 We are just recovering from the greatest conflict the world has ever known. I have reference to the War, and the Epidemic of Influenza. Records show that over half a million deaths to our American people are the results. This does not include those left crippled by the war. We have a great work imposed upon us to preserve humanity and make our Nation's standard second to none. We read with regret the loss of lives by the war, and the Epidemic, but heretofore very little attention has been paid to those killed and injured in Railroad accidents.

Railroads of the country have adopted a Bureau of Safety, and we are constantly putting before our employees matters of importance, protecting themselves, and the public, but the public has to co-operate with us if we make a success.

Several suggestions have been made, and one was to ask our Ministers and Principals to make mention in the pulpits and schools, pleading with them to be more careful in driving their automobiles and other vehicles over Railroad crossings. I have known on several occasions where every occupant of the car or other vehicle lost their lives while attempting to cross the tracks and not heeding the signal "Stop, Look, and Listen."

It is also dangerous to walk on the tracks, but in spite of the warning signal placed before the public, they continue this practice, many losing lives. The double track of this Southern country, recently inaugurated, makes it more hazardous. The public seems not to realize that when a train has just passed a crossing, there will likely to another one in the opposite direction within a few seconds. That is why we should "Stop, Look, and Listen."
