PROHIBITIONISTS ARE READY FOR FIGHT

Lincoln, Neb., July 23.—With the national convention finished and a ticket placed in the field, for the fall campaign, prohibition delegates today were on their way home and the newly elected national committee was making its plans for the coming fight with the Democrats and Republicans.

The convention adjourned shortly after midnight after naming Aaron S. Watkins, Germantown, Ohio, school teacher, as its standard bearer and D. Leigh Colvin, New York, author, as his running mate. The nominations came after Wm. J. Bryan had sent word that he could not accept because he wished to remain a Democrat, although he had not decided how he would vote this fall.

In addition to planning for the campaign the national committee expects to issue a statement today or in the next few days hailing known its feeling toward Senator Harding's prohibition pronouncements in his speech of acceptance yesterday. Individual members said it seemed unsatisfactory at first glance but wanted more time to study it.

FOCH WILL NOT GO TO WARSAW

Paris, July 23.—Marshall Foch will not go to Warsaw unless the report of the French and British missions now en route indicates the necessity of his presence and should developments show that military aid by the allies is required to prevent the Bolsheviks from overrunning Poland, it was learned today.

Some hope is entertained in official circles that direct armistice negotiations between Poland and Soviet Russia may make allied intervention unnecessary.

FARM BUREAU OPENS SESSION

Chicago, July 23.—The Farm Bureau Federation, comprising a membership of 1,250,000 in thirty-two states, opened a two-day conference today to consider the advisability of establishing one great farmers grain market, where the products of the farm may be sold direct to the manufacturer or consumer.

Speakers declared that grain brokers now charge the farmers \$50,000,000 each year for handling their crops.

Preliminary to today's meeting the general board of the National Board of Farmers' organizations met and plans were laid for raising a \$11,500,000 fund for erecting the Temple of Agriculture at Washington.

MANY HOUSES WRECKED IN CALTRA

London, July 23.—Caltra, near Ballingsole, Ireland, was visited today by police and military who wrecked many houses in the town, including the Sinn Fein hall which was burned to ashes. "Up Tuam," according to a message from the Press Association correspondent in Ballingole today. There was much shooting, but no loss of life is reported.

The slogan "Up Tuam," evidently refers to Sunday night's incident, when Tuam was sacked, the sacking being charged against the police as a reprisal for the murder of two constables by a mob.

RECEPTION FOR MISSIONARY

Tokio, June 12. A notable reception was held yesterday for Rev. Clay McCauley, of Boston, who after 31 years of missionary effort in Japan as the representative of the Unitarian church, will return to his home country in July.

Dr. McCauley was hailed as an American who had labored "for the promotion of religious liberalism in Japan, a better understanding and good will between the United States and Japan and the furtherance of international cooperation and peace." Among the organizations which joined in the public tribute were the American-Japan Society, the American Association, the American Peace Society, the Asiatic Society of Japan and the Association of Concordia.

Baron Sakatani presided and the speakers included Viscount McCauley's long and helpful work for all things for the bettering and uplifting of mankind.

BAND AT FUNERAL OF JOSE CASTRO

San Jose, Cal., July 23.—A thirty piece band will be in attendance at the funeral of Jose Castro, aged inmate of the county hospital here, whose body was found today in a pond in a down town park. Five years ago, it became known following the discovery of the body. Castro deposited in a local bank money to cover his funeral expenses and contracted with an undertaker to provide a thirty piece band and a hearse drawn by six white horses. Owing to the death of the white horses the undertaker will be unable to comply with that part of the contract. An automobile hearse will be substituted.

POLAND SENDS ARMISTICE

Warsaw, July 23.—Poland has sent armistice proposals direct to the Soviet government at Moscow.

After these proposals had been dispatched by wireless, at 2 o'clock this afternoon by the National Council of Defense, a new coalition cabinet was formed under the premiership of M. Witos.

The new cabinet has the support of the socialist party. M. Datsenski, the head of the socialist's organization is the vice premier. Aside from these two changes the cabinet remains the same.

FRENCH TROOPS MARCH ON DAMASCUS

Beirut, Syria, July 23.—French troops, in view of the failure of King Feisel of Syria, to begin execution of the ultimatum terms began a march on Damascus yesterday. They encountered no opposition and are proceeding toward Alepho.

VILLA HEADED FOR COAHUILA

Mexico City, July 22.—General Villa and his forces, said to number a hundred men, are heading toward Coahuila, according to statements of deserters as reported by General Joaquin Amro, chief of operations at Chihuahua. The rebels are described as poorly equipped.
