HE UNION TIMES France Actively Engaged in . Harnessing Water Power

> Paris, Dec. 28 .- The work of harnessing the water power of France is by Germany, that some optimists beneed of coal from outside before the

statesmen finish their parleys. France is supposed to have nine million horse natural water power. Five hundred thousand horse power had been put to use before the war; an equal amount was installed during hostilities; three hundred thousand have been added since the armistice, and two hundred thousand more soon will be in use, making a total of a million and a half, equal to half the total stationary steam pow-

er used in France in 1913. The plans of the Public Works Department, as explained to The Asso ciated Press, provide for the ultilization of approximately four million horse power within five years. Kaw Indians Rally to Their Woman Chief

Chief Lucy is the first head the Kaw ndians have had since 1908 when Chief Washunga was frozen to death She is the wife of John R. Eads, a white man. The two with their children live on the new chief's allotment, an inheritance of 800 acres. They are mong the few who have not disposed f any of their property. They raise vestock of all kinds, are thrifty and their children to the white end their children to the white chools.

"The best material for the job," is he way the Indians describe Chief mcy. And John Eads, who is a couin of James Buchanan Eads, who wilt the Eads bridge across the Mis is ippi river at St. Louis, proudly akes his place as husband of the chief. "She is an excellent wife, a ne mother, the best nurse living and understands the needs of her people,"

Lucy Tayiah with her brother, Em. mett, were adopted years ago by old Washunga, who led the Kaw Indians from their lands in Kansas in 1873 to new allotment in Oklahoma terriery. He sent them to Haskell instiute, after they had completed the ribal schools. Here Lucy distinguishd herself as a student and became inerested in nursing. After her graduation from Haskell, she went to New 'ork City and became a graduate urse. She remained there severa! years and then returned to her own people. Her brother also lives in the Kaw country, near the little village of Washunga, named after the old tribal

The Kaws, like many other Indians ave sold and dissipated their holdngs and are now reduced to poverty. Although their lands join those of the rich Osage, and oil derricks can be seen rising in the distance, the Kaws have reaped no minerel benefit as yet.
