STATE RIGHTS MR. NIXON'S SPEECH.

Before the committee of the Senate on Mr. Friston's report, and Mr. Smith's amendment, in the Legislature of South Carolina, December 15, 1822. Mr. Nixon said, I rise Mr. Chairman deeply impressed with the solemnity of the oath we have all taken...

Mr. N. said, the fact was obvious, that the principles of the report of the special committee, were ultra federal, they inculcated a doctrine of passive obedience, which was humiliating to his feelings as a man, and as a citizen.

But, the gentleman from Edgefield has told us, that we ought not to discuss the subjects embraced in this report, because no practical utility can be produced by it.

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Continued from the administration of Madison, in the reorganization of the old State, and by almost to see apart, and pledge its honor, as a band for internal improvement...

As the subjects under consideration, depend on a correct knowledge of the powers of the General and State governments, and as the gentleman from Edgefield has asserted, with great emphasis, that it is only necessary to refer to the origin and organization of the government...

It was soon found requisite, from the very nature of the case, not only, that the States should form local governments, and laws, but that they should be bound together, politically, by one common tie of union.

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
