HEADQUARTERS,
Columbia, January 20th, 1827.
THE following Regiments and Corps will pa-
rade for review and exercise at the times and
places specified below:

The 10th Col. Cross, the 17th Col. Hayne's,
Yeaton's Artillery and Cobin's Cavalry, near
Charleston on Tuesday the 6th day of March
next.

The 10th Col. Vanderhorst's, at Strawberry
ferry, on Thursday the 8th day of March next.

The 18th Col. Walter's, at Falgout on Satur-
day the 10th day of March next.

The 15th Col. Rice's at Waterborough, on Tues-
day the 13th day of March next.

The 12th Col. Allison's, at Cooper's bridge, on
Thursday the 15th day of March next.

The 43rd Col. Howell's, at Buford's Bridge, on
Saturday the 17th day of March next.

The 11th Col. Cooper's, at Ashley's on Tuesday
the 20th day of March next.

The 16th Col. Arthur's, at Williamson's, on
Thursday the 22nd day of March next.

And the 14th Col. Lehrs's at Henry Seel's, on
Saturday the 24th day of March next.

The regiments and corps attached to them will
be formed for review at 12 o'clock meridian pre-
cisely. The commanding officer of the division,
the officers commanding brigades and the staff at-
tached to each command, will attend within their
respective commands, fully equipped. The Cavalry
and Artillery will turn out with those regiments
of Infantry within whose limits they are
respectively situated. The Deputy Adjutant Gen-
eral of the second division, is ordered to obtain in
very instance, correct returns from the regiments,
of their strength, arms and accoutrements, with
duplicates, conformable with the forms heretofore
prescribed; and to make a complete division return
to the chief of his department.
Court martial will also be ordered on all delin-
quents.

In consideration of the dangerous and exposed
condition in which the islands of Wadmalaw, Ed-
isto and St John's must be left, if the militia re-
maining upon them are required to attend the re-
view of the 15th Regiment, to which they are at-
tached, the Commandant in Chief directs that
they shall not be required to assemble with said
regiment at Waterborough for review.
