

LOCAL ITEMS

A portion of the wharf at Port Royal gave way yesterday. Akden & Waters of St. Helena, lost some groceries that were on the wharf at the time.

Messrs Robbins, Boddington & Co cleared, last Saturday, the British bark Architect for Highbridge Eng., with 21,623 feet lumber and 19,766 cubic feet timber, valued at \$3,200.

Hamilton Robinson has issued a call for a meeting at the Arsenal next Friday evening to nominate candidates for Intendant and Wardens. The opposition has not taken any action yet.

The sheriff advertises to-day several valuable pieces of property. A desirable house and lot, and a sail boat are also offered for sale in our advertising columns.

Peter Green jr., St. Helena; Wm. Brodie, Beaufort, and R. Barry, Beaufort have been drawn as jurors to serve at the October term of the U. S. court in Charleston.

Mr. Geo. Holmes has been visiting Florida. The Volusia Herald says he is looking after his investments there and will soon return to that place to make a prolonged stay.

Mr. Barnwell was called on to hold an inquest on Monday last on the body of a colored woman on the Cottage plantation. No evidence of foul play was discovered and the jury returned a verdict accordingly.

If the immense watermelon brought by Mr. Holmes from the farm of Mr. John R. Ch., in Florida, to Mr. Wright is a sample of the fruit of that country, Florida must indeed be a great State. The melon weighed 85 pounds and measured 5x37 inches in circumference, and we are told that this is much smaller than many Mr. Rich is obliged to dispose of, but it was selected for its excellent flavor, which, indeed, was superb. Mr. Wright invited a few friends in to discuss the merits of the melon and all agreed that it was just what a water melon should be—fresh, sweet and large.

The growers of early potatoes in this vicinity for the New York markets so far as we can learn all realized handsomely from their returns, this year, most of the crop selling for \$6.50 per barrel in New York. One of our farmers sold 500 barrels at from \$6 to \$6.50. If the prospect be bright another season the planters will go into the business largely, as it is a much more safe and profitable crop than anything else that could be planted on the islands our soil and climate being admirably adapted for truck farming.

It is now said on good authority that the monitors that were with us last Winter will all return during August and September, and that the Miantonomah and Terror also will come here. We hear about School Ships and Naval drills to come off but these are possibilities which all hope may become realities.

Mr. Crofut, deputy collector, seized, last Saturday, forty-six empty cigar boxes on which the stamps had not been defaced in the store of Mr. Hoffman. Mr. H. will find it will cost him handsomely for this neglect to comply with the law although there is no doubt of his innocence of any intention to defraud the Government. Those of our planters who are issuing tobacco to their hands had better take out licenses or they will soon wish they had.

The colored people hereabouts make use of the ox instead of the mule. He is faithful as a box of pills, and somewhat slower than lightning. A man who has driven an ox team all his life is selected as a pall bearer at funerals, as he never gets ahead of the procession. The bull is chiefly celebrated for his disposition, which is in cut going, and gathered in quite full. He generally wears an ear-ring in his nose, and has curiosity to know how you are made inside?

SHOOTING FOR A PRIZE. OUR CITIZENS AT THE TRIGGER.

A stranger in Beaufort might have thought that the movement against Mexico had really begun when he saw all our citizens who delight in pulling the trigger moving westward last Monday armed with Winchester rifles, and a gleam of determination in their eyes that showed that they were bent on shooting something. It was astonishing to see what a large number of these celebrated guns were hidden away in the residences of our people and one could not but think that their presence betokened a determination to make good use of them had occasion offered during the late political excitement.

The cause of their appearance on Monday was to compete for a prize of a double barreled English shot-gun to be shot for at a distance of 200 yards. There were 80 chances at \$1.00 each, each chance to have 3 shots at a target on the Creedmoor plan with a possible score of 18. The chances were all promptly taken and for a week previous to the day set for the contest the sportsmen kept up a constant fusillade at the target in order to steady their nerves for the struggle. When the hour arrived the company assembled on the ground, which was near the Atlantic Saw Mills, and firing began at about 3 p. m. Those who had been practicing during the previous few days and had made good scores were surprised that the bullets refused to lodge just where they were aimed and the most sanguine showed a willingness to sell out their chances to others who were not willing to give up the prize so long as a shot could be bought. The first score worth mentioning was by Mr. Lockwood on the sixth chance, he making 12, followed on the 13th by Mr. W. W. Farr who scored 13. This figure kept the lead

so long that many thought it would secure the prize and it was not until the 62d chance that Mr. Lockwood raised the figure making 15, leading off with a bull's eye. Mr. Farr however, on the 67th chance made an equal score, and as no other shots equalled or excelled them the prize lay between Messrs Farr and Lockwood, the former having shot 21 chances and the latter 12—only five of them, however, for himself. In firing off the tie Mr. Lockwood led off, but unfortunately missed the target on the first fire, making 8 in the two remaining shots while his adversary scored 12 and secured the prize.

Mr. Farr fired 21 shots and his total score was 217—an average of 10 1/2. Mr. Lockwood fired 12 shots making an average of 11 1/2—12.

Capt. Willett had a fine iron target made for the occasion and offered every facility for the success of the match, which was so much enjoyed by the shooters. Another prize is to be shot for soon.

Peter Holmes was sent to the penitentiary for five years by Judge Reed.
