It is also suggested that the veterans who are organized, march from their headquarters to the place of the public meeting, that an appropriate program be arranged with a prominent speaker; that patriotic songs be sung and prayers of thankfulness be offered up; that the actual program last not longer than one hour and one-half and that a full report of your meeting be mailed here within three days after your celebration.

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## Feel Charges Challenge To Mrs. Bethune

### Her Supporters Rally to Cause, Promise Battle

WASHINGTON. — (ANP) — "The recent report against the NYA charging irregularities is merely an attempt to smear NYA," said Verne Kuhne, speaking for Aubrey Williams, Thursday afternoon in the NYA headquarters in this city when questioned by an ANP representative on the status of the charges given wide publication in local papers the previous day.

"The first we knew was when we read of it in the papers," said Mr. Kuhne, "and we are not in a position to say anything much about it. First, we would have to see the report and study it."

The report submitted by Lindsay G. Warren of North Carolina, the new controller general of the United States, charges "numerous irregularities and questionable transactions" touched the Negro question when it included in a categorical denouncement, "13-aviation school for Negroes in Chicago taken over by the N. Y. A."

Mr. Kuhne said the matter immediately was referred to the Illinois authorities for a complete investigation, pending the full report and nothing was available at this time, either a defense or denial of the charges.

Going into the matter at some length, it would seem that the whole report was built with an idea of rousing the wrath of the southern bloc of representatives and senators who oppose anything representing any progress in the part of the colored citizenry of the country.

Among the charges were such as payment of per diem while on actual leave, designation of headquarters for the convenience of employees and other similar charges which were brought without the knowledge of the personnel of the NYA.

The whole matter is described as a well defined plan to discredit the Negroes in the NYA and an effort to curtail the benefits they have been receiving lately as a result of liberal minded persons who see in the training program of the NYA the salvation of the young Negro in the United States.

The charges listed in the report, which was not submitted to the NYA at the time it was handed the controller, gives them little time to prepare answers, but the officials are not perturbed and hope within a short time to be able to completely refute all charges laid against the NYA.

**CHALLENGE TO MRS. BETHUNE**  
Some seem to feel that the charges are a direct challenge to the popularity and power of Mrs. Mary McLeod Bethune and see in the hidden charges direct accusations at the actions of the head of the Negro division.

But her supporters have rallied to the cause immediately and declare that there is nothing in the charges which directly or indirectly affect the stand she has taken for her people in the administration and they further promise a bitter battle should the integrity of Mrs. Bethune be questioned or assailed.
