

# NAACP 'FINDS' S. C. WHITE PRIMARY ANSWER

## Thurgood Marshall's Staff Busy On Voting Suit To Be Filed In South Carolina; Affects Georgia

After two weeks of research, the NAACP's legal staff reported this week it had found a "proper" court approach to the South Carolina "white" Democratic primary, which had baffled the county's ablest lawyers since the state repealed primary laws in 1914, and that a case may be filed as early as next day.

Disclosure of the development was made in a letter from Thurgood Marshall, chief of the NAACP legal staff, to John H. W. Moore, chairman of the congressional Democratic party, being held at 6th James M. Houston, state NAACP president, and Attorney A. T. Wadden, both of Atlanta and leaders of the state Democratic party.

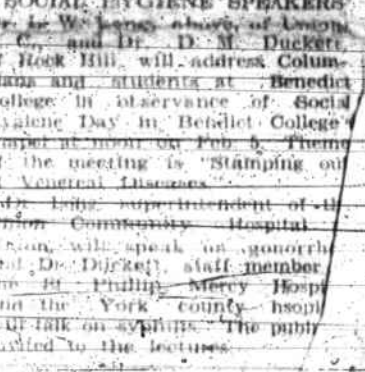

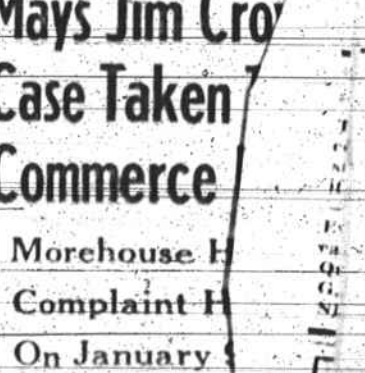

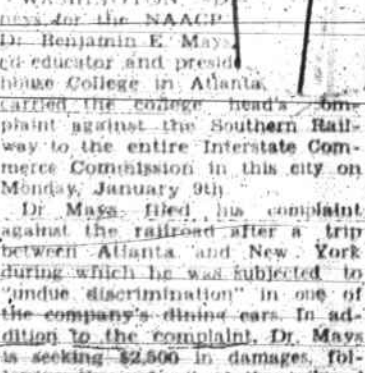

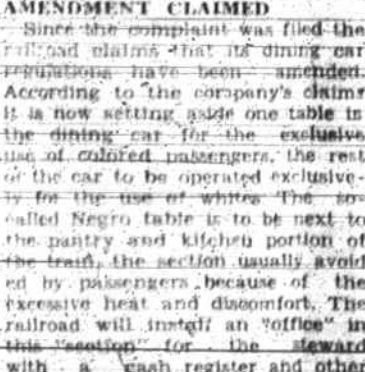
MOREHOUSE H. COMPLAINT H.

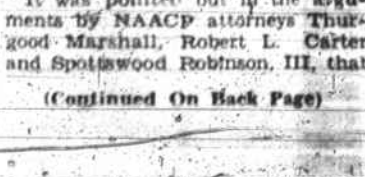
BILBO'S MOUTH OPERATION OKAY
