Press Gallery Committee Moves To Broaden Rules

By LOUIS LEATHER for daily coverage. Arbitrary figures as to the number of weeklies or aggregators circulation which would qualify a newspaper for accreditation was purpose of the committee. The committee said the intent of its proposal is to admit "news associations" of weekly papers whose writings have a truly national or large regional circulation of general interest and whose associations serve a large portion of weekly papers. The committee's proposal specifically precludes the admission of representatives of individual weekly papers. The committee said consideration for their admission should be undertaken by the periodical rather than the daily press galleries. The standing committee of correspondents has proposed an addition to the congressional press gallery rules which would permit correspondents or associations representing weekly newspapers to be admitted to the galleries. It was announced Monday. The proposed addition would admit to the press galleries not more than two Washington correspondents each for bona-fide news associations which regularly service news of national affairs to a substantial number of weekly newspapers which are entitled to second class mailing privileges. They are not regularly for profit and pay the association for third prize winning essay. Announcing the addition to the rules, the standing committee of correspondents said it thought that the weekly press should not be denied access to gallery facilities. Under present rules only correspondents for daily newspapers or weeklies that crowded gallery conditions do not permit unrestricted influx of large numbers of people writing for the weekly press, and it would oppose any relaxation of rules which in any way interfere with facilities by magazines are admitted.
