ATLANTA SPORTS FANS URGED TO GIVE SIAC THINCLADS A "BREAK"

The cream of the present crop of thinclads in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference will invade Atlanta this weekend to compete in the Tenth Annual Track and Field Meet, which will be held Saturday at the Atlanta University Bowl. The conduct of Atlanta track fans has never been up to par, and for some reason seems to be getting worse. It is reported that last weekend when the annual City Track and Field Meet was held, the officials could hardly get the events off on schedule on account of the conduct of the fans. That is why your reporter is taking time out to urge the fans to keep off the track and out of the oval this weekend and give the track field stars a break. Be more considerate for the sprinters, who are already on edge while waiting for the gun to go off. They break, but the starter calls them back because somebody jumped the gun. When they are all set again, ready to streak down the dirt, the official at the finish line waves the starter to hold it, until he clears the track. The gun goes off, and the race is on, but on their way down the track, the sprinters can see the fans closing-in from all sides, making it difficult to run in the outside lanes. Pick out the most advantageous spot on the bank and stay there.

Now about the present crop of track and field stars. Little is known about the thinclads from South Carolina State, Benedict, Alabama A. and M., and Knoxville, but there can be no doubt that these institutions will enter strong teams. Alabama State, Fisk, Florida A. and M., Fort Valley State, Morehouse, Morris Brown, Tuskegee and Xavier competed in the recent Tuskegee Relays Carnival, so it is generally known that they have a plenty to offer in the way of track talent. With the Clark College Panthers, defending champions, out the fans may look forward to a "free-for-all" for the 1947 SIAC track crown between Tuskegee, Morris Brown, Morehouse, Xavier and Alabama State. Tuskegee will be the team to beat in the One-Mile Relay, but the Morehouse foursome may give the Golden Tigers a merry chase. Outstanding individual stars will include James Cahy, Robert Knight, of Tuskegee; John Jones, Alabama State; Belfield, Willie Ball, Xavier; Allen Perry, John Thomas, William Turner, James Holmes, Morris Brown; Carl Fuqua, Luther Ware, Schelley Lipscomb, and Johnnie Floyd, Morehouse.

SELLING BASEBALL TO ATLANTA FANS IS NO EASY ASSIGNMENT

Selling baseball to Atlanta fans is no easy assignment. Last fall, the attendance at practically all of the football games was exceptionally good. Then during the hardwood season, the Morehouse College Gymnasium and Sunset Casino were generally jammed with basketball fans. Turning to baseball, it is perhaps unreasonable to expect the overflow crowds that packed the stands during the war, when most people were making much more money and GI's were visiting the Gate City in record numbers each weekend. Even so, however, the attendance is off. Atlanta fans are not supporting any of their teams, intercollegiate, semi-pro or professional. Sunday, approximately 2,000 fans were on hand to see the Atlanta Black Crackers open their 1947 season in the Negro Southern League. This would not have been a bad crowd for a mid-week contest, but it was much too small for a weekend twinnbill to open the season in a metropolitan city.

Another word about Sunday's opener. Following the doubleheader, it did not take long for the writer to discover that the only people satisfied were the members of the Nashville Cubs' roster. Atlanta fans were disgusted because the Black Crackers booted away the opener, with the game practically in the bag. Then the Black Management staff was dissatisfied because the attendance was off. It was indeed a bad day, both for the fans and for the Black Crackers' owners. It would certainly be grand if Black Crackers would hit their stride. At least this would not give the fans an excuse for staying away. Then, too, the fans should not be too critical. The Black Cracker roster is undergoing a dras, shake up and could hardly be expected to function with finesse in Sunday's twinnbill. Everybody in Atlanta wants a winning team, but why get impatient. The season has just started, and chances are the fans will see a hustling and aggressive outfit on the field in a few days. With better attendance, the management will be able to invest more in money in topflight players, and here's hoping that when the owners gets a winning combination, they will be wise enough to keep it intact.

ASHEVILLE AND NASHVILLE SET PACE IN NEGRO SOUTHERN LOOP

Sunday was opening day in the Negro Southern League and the Asheville Blues and Nashville jumped out in front by sweeping doubleheaders. While the Nashville Blues were spanking the Black Crackers, 6-5 and 4-0, the Asheville Blues were blanking the Chattanooga Choo Choo, 3-0 and 15-0. At Little Rock, the New Orleans Creoles and Memphis Blues, made their debut in the league by splitting a twinnbill and Jacksonville and Shreveport did not play.

Morris Brown Trips Morehouse; To Play Tuskegee This Weekend

Backing up Henry Franklin's sensational hurling with superb fielding the Morris Brown College Purple Wolverines tripped the Morehouse College Maroon Tigers, 6-4, Saturday afternoon, at Harper's Field to win the first city intercollegiate baseball crown in more than 18 years.

This weekend the Purple Wolverines will face an acid test when they take the field against the smooth-slicking Tuskegee Institute Golden Tigers in a two-game series scheduled for 3:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday at Harper's Field.

The Maroon Tigers jumped out in front with a one-run lead in the top of the first, when Harold Tosias and George Brown came through with two straight singles and Otis Smith beat out an infield hit. Morris Brown pushed over four runs in the last half of the first, when the Morehouse infield cracked and Tom Everett, Morehouse's ace hurler, was pinned for his first error.

The Purple Wolverines increased the lead with single runs in the second and third frames on singles by Irwin Greene, Franklin, and Earl Dinkins. Then added another marker in the fifth, when DePoy Arnold doubled to leftfield to send Jimmy Wilson across the plate.

Morehouse staged a three-run rally in the top of the sixth on Maurice Moore's smashing double, another single by Brown and a Morris Brown error. The final Morris Brown tally came in the top half of the sixth on two infield miscues and a single by Wilson.

Franklin gave up six hits before being relieved by Frederick Shepherd in the seventh inning. The only hit recorded against Shepherd was Beck's infield hit in the ninth inning. Meanwhile, Everett went the route for Morehouse and gave up only eight hits. Beck, Brown and Stephens shared batting honors with two hits each.
