## CANNON STREET HOSPITAL FACES CRISIS

The Hospital and Training School for Nurses, 154 years old, known as the McClellan Hospital and lately the Cannon St. Hospital faces a crisis. The hospital does not meet the standards set by the State Health Board under the Hill-Burton Act. The hospital has recently been operating under a provisional license because of its need in the community.

Dr. T. C. McFall, medical director reports that approximately 400 patients are admitted a year. About 75 major operations are performed. About 100 babies are delivered. Five to six infants are cared for. The staff four registered nurses, five practical nurses, two maids, a maintenance man, a cook, one maid and a janitor.

This year Roper Hospital requested Charleston County to loan to effect a loan to build an expansion to the new building.

Old Roper would be abandoned. The Cannon Street Hospital also and qualified Negro physicians would be permitted to practice in Roper depending upon the conditions and standards determined by the State Board of Health under the Hill-Burton Act.
