OUT OF 4 CHILDLESS COUPLES HAD BABIES AFTER TREATMENT

NEW YORK—One out of four childless couples who are treated at infertility clinics have babies, Dr. Mary Steichen Calderone, medical director of the Planned Parenthood Federation, disclosed at a panel discussion on "Help for the Childless" at the federation's annual meeting at the Waldorf-Astoria Thursday. Her figures were based on a nation-wide survey of infertility clinics.

Another speaker, Dr. Kenneth Kelley, associate professor in psychiatry at Columbia University, discussed psychosomatic aspects of infertility and asserted that deep-seated emotional difficulties may be frequently the hidden cause of inability to achieve pregnancy.

Dr. Calderone pointed out that the number of infertility clinics in the country has more than doubled in the last five years, increasing from 67 in 1949 to 151 at present. Out of 13,051 patients treated in the clinics, 3,026 pregnancies developed, she pointed out.

"The significance of these figures," Dr. Calderone concluded, "lies in the fact that they exemplify the very broad base on which Planned Parenthood is functioning today. It is only the informed outsider who thinks that we are primarily concerned with family limitation."

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Reuther Leads Decision

Walter P. Reuther, president of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, called the decision "a heartwarming reaffirmation of American democratic principles." "As a result of this historic decision," Mr. Reuther said, "united front over race is a reality in the United States, and we are confident that the future will be bright for the Negro people."

Reuther II, however, was not a member of the National Citizens Commission, which he said that they are doing the NAACP for "a separation solution." A group of citizens in helping to produce the most important racial development in the century.

The Hon. Christian A. Herter, governor of Massachusetts, expressed "personal gratification" at the decision and said that "a full understanding of the problems involved by all parties concerned and with sincere, intelligent planning, I feel confident that the spirit of the law, as well as the letter, will be happily accepted by all good Americans."

A message from the American Jewish Congress asserted: "The successful climax to the campaign you have relentlessly waged for so many years will inspire all Americans to rededicate themselves with fresh zeal to our common responsibility of constantly extending and improving our democracy."

"A Turning Point"

The decision was called "a turning point in the history of America" by the Baltimore chapter of The Links, a national women's organization, and "another step in service to human relations" by the Women of America Club, Inc.

A telegram from the student and faculty of LeMoyne College in Memphis, Tenn., commended the vote for the NAACP on a "historic and commendable act in behalf of all Americans."

Bartley Crum, a Nashville, Tenn., attorney and former publisher of the New York newspaper, PM and the Star, said the decision "is a very real step forward in the solution of the problems of our country, both home and abroad, and a tremendous amount of the credit must go to the NAACP for your everlasting efforts to end the house of segregation."

Carl C. Wynn, a Knoxville, Tenn., lawyer, called the decision "a cheering contribution to all of equal terms" which "brings nearer to democracy."

The show will be open to farmers, 4-H clubbers and NFA boys in the Edisto area for the purpose of demonstrating better feeding practices and promoting

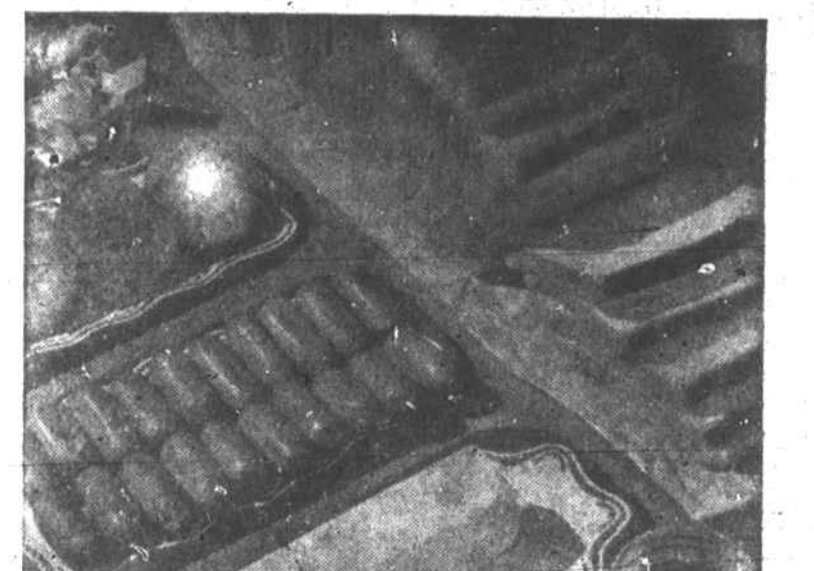
a better livestock program in general. In the spring of 1954 they netted a total of \$11,348.18 for sale of hogs and cattle.
