

Poultry Industry In For Clean-up

CHICAGO—President Earl W. Jimerson and Secretary-Treasurer Patrick E. Gorman of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America today announced that their union is ready to spend one million dollars to clean up the poultry industry of the United States.

This action followed a National Conference which was attended by 315 delegates from all sections of the nation in Chicago this week. Notice to each of the local unions praised the hundreds of poultry slaughterers both in and out of the union who maintain a code of producing only healthy and wholesome poultry for human consumption.

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CHERAW — It was learned here last week that a certain principal, carrying out the wishes of his superintendent, is demanding that teachers sign a pledge against desegregation of the schools before their contracts are renewed.

COLUMBIA — The "loyalty oath" instituted by the State Board of Education for use with Negro teachers does not refer to communism at all, but to whether or not one belongs to NAACP. The "oath" instituted at least three years ago and stealthily used from time to time has not been effective since the Palmetto Education Association and the NAACP state conference have marched along together for the benefit of Negro Children, with many thousands of PMA money being given to finance legal action against "Negro" facilities.

COLUMBIA — Persistent reports are that the statement in "Jet Magazine" to the effect that Negroes would support for Lee-ly L. Bates in the recent gubernatorial election was planted by someone in South Carolina who is in some high position with "Jet." It has been reliably ascertained that this person, who is not named, does some anonymous "Jet" reporting for the magazine. The magazine has been well paid so far for the planted statement, but is to receive a much larger reward for the double-cross of a longtime friend. The statement was widely used in "Timmerman" advertisements against Bates, and it is relayed reported that 30,000 copies of the magazine were purchased, as a special order.

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ORANGEBURG — George O. Miller, S. C. State college sophomore, during a southeastern province meeting of the Newman Club in Tampa, Fla., was elected province treasurer, the first time a Negro college student was honored with an office. The province consists of the Carolinas, Georgia, and Florida. Miller was nominated by a Georgia Tech student and elected unanimously. The Newman Clubs are organizations of Catholic youth.

ANDERSON — Mrs. Andrew W. Sinkins, state NAACP secretary, will address the Peoples Burial Aid Society during the annual meeting of the organization to be held at Able Baptist church, near Pickens, on July 12. The meeting was announced by Mrs. Sinkins, secretary.

MANNING — Claudius D. Atlantic Beach was awarded the W. beach home of Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Graham Taylor prize for outstanding students in agriculture from the Agricultural Institute, to conduct social affairs of the Game Warden there to finish their Beta Chapter of the Omega Psi Chi.

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
