COUNTY FAIR.

Tuesday, October 16th, will be "School Day" at the County Fair and the indications now are, that this will be a record-breaker from a standpoint of attendance. Already reports are being received from all sections of the County that the schools would attend in a body.

Supt. of Education Martin has recommended that this day be made a holiday for all schools in the County. The management of the Association has made arrangements to furnish every teacher and pupil in the County a complimentary ticket for this day, and it is expected that they will all come.

The committee is preparing a programme of athletic events which will be announced later. A prize of \$50 in cash will be given as first, second and third prizes to the winners of the athletic events.

Demonstration Agent Jas. W. Shealy was here today and stated to a representative of The Dispatch-News that he had never seen as much enthusiasm displayed with reference to the County Fair as is already being shown. He stated that he had been practically through every section of the County and everybody is coming to the County Fair. While here today Mr. Shealy visited the fair grounds and reserved space for the community fair exhibits and for the Boys' Corn and Pig Clubs. One entire building will be given to the community fair exhibits, of which there will be at least four.

Mr. S. L. Hendrix, the energetic and experienced general superintendent of the fair, said this morning that he was receiving encouragement on every hand and as he expressed it this would certainly be the biggest and best fair ever held in Lexington County.

Kopp and Harrington's Great Southern Shows have put up a cash bond of \$300.00 for their appearance and they will be here without fail to furnish fun and amusement for all. They have ten shows, fifty concessions, ferris-wheel and a ten thousand dollar merry-go-round. A good time is in store for all who attend.
