## TAFT WANTS ARMIES OF FIVE MILLION MEN

Washington, March 25.—Amend-  
ment of the draft law to authorize  
the president to increase the army 5-  
000,000 men or more was advocated  
here today before the National Geo-  
graphic Society.

"We must make ample provisions  
to strengthen our allies," the former  
president said. "We can raise as  
fine an army, as large an army, as  
there is on European soil and, if we  
can transport it as rapidly as we may  
we can have it all in Europe within  
two or three years."

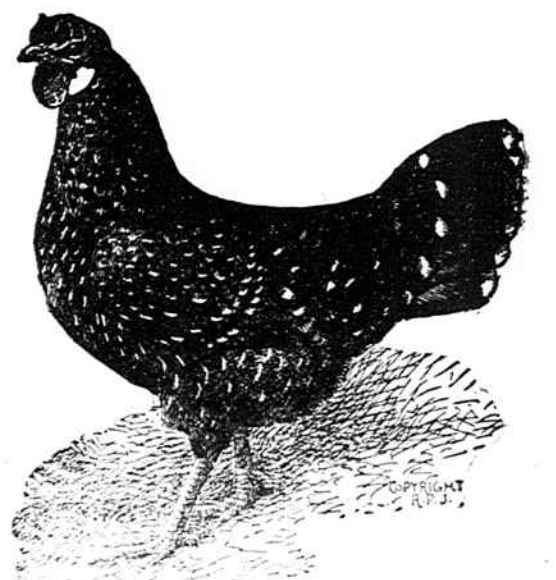
