NEGRO KILLS MAN AND SHOTS WIFE.

While in a fit of jealousy late Saturday afternoon Tillman Pinkney, a negro, shot and killed Stroman Hampton, another negro, and also fired a load of shot into the back of his own wife, inflicting a wound which will doubtless prove fatal.

The scene of the tragedy was near the south end of Gutters' mill pond dam at Swansea. Pinkney, it is understood saw Hampton and his (Pinkney's) wife riding about in a buggy together; and he secured a gun and lay in waiting for the two to pass. Two shots were fired, the man receiving the first charge.

Deputy Sheriff W. M. Laird was called and was soon upon the grounds. The officer found Pinkney in the town of Swansea and placed him under arrest, later bringing the accused to the county jail.

The inquest was conducted by Magistrate Martin on Sunday morning.

PATRIOTIC RALLY AT BATESBURG

A patriotic rally will be held at Batesburg Friday April 19th, at 8 o'clock P. M. at the Band Stand in the public square at Batesburg. There will be a red cross parade, school parade, band from Camp Jackson and addresses by Rev. H. R. Murchison of State Council of Defense, and Dr. D. W. Daniel of Clemson College. This will be one of the biggest occasions ever held in Batesburg and the largest crowd ever assembled there will be present. The committee in charge announce—IF YOU ARE—a weak—kneed un-American Pacifist stay away in partnership with the Kaiser, stay away. Croaking while our boys are fighting, stay away. IF YOU ARE—A true American citizen, believing in her rights and liberties come.

Against that bunch of Kaiser worshiping, baby murdering, girl ravishing, well poisoning thieves and pirates come. In the fight with Woodrow against the Kaiser, Liberty against Hohenzollernism, America against Germany fourteen against Hell, come.

SAYS JUDGMENT DAY IS NEAR AT HAND.

A number of people gathered at different points on the streets of Lexington Saturday and listened to a "street preacher" for several hours. The man who was selling a little book which he called the "My Series" declared that Judgment Day was coming at the end of the war; and endeavored to prove his assertions by passages in the Bible. The unknown preacher however, was unable to say when the war would close.

BANK OF WESTERN CAROLINA DOES IT'S BIT

The stockholders at their annual meeting at Aiken on 16th voted \$2,000 to the Red Cross, to be divided among the counties in which its branches are located in proportion to the Deposits on Dec. 31, 1917.

The Directors on the same day directed the officers to subscribe for \$125,000 Liberty Loan Bonds which with the previous subscriptions make the amount now held by the Bank \$200,000. The \$125,000 is to be divided among the Branches in proportion to their deposits and of this the town of Lexington will get \$10,000 which will aid in raising her quota.

The Bank will loan to purchasers of Bonds for the purpose of paying the purchase price 90 per cent of the face value of the Bonds at 6 per cent.
