## STORES CLOSE FOR MORE THAN 100 BIG RALLY NEW SUBSCRIBERS

With every business house in Lexington closed, and amid a steady downpour of rain, the people of Lexington packed the county court house to its full capacity on Friday afternoon, to hear addresses by the Rev. H. R. Murchison and Mrs. Annie I. Rembert. The occasion was the big patriotic rally called by Dr. D. M. Crosson of Leesville, chairman of the Lexington County Council of Defense. It was an occasion for the people to demonstrate, in an open and public way, their patriotism as well as their allegiance to, and faith in, the American flag. And every member of the large and enthusiastic audience entered into the meeting with whole-hearted fervor, and eagerly did they grasp every word that fell from the speakers' lips. It was an audience composed of men, women and children—every one of whom are enlisted in the great work of winning the war, and helping to give liberty and freedom to all mankind.

The meeting was opened with a song, "In the Sweet Bye and Bye," led by Sheriff Sim J. Miller, followed by the invocation by the Rev. W. H. Riser, pastor of Saint Stephen's Lutheran church.

Dr. Crosson, in introducing Dr. Murchison, thanked the people for their attendance, which was but another evidence of Lexington's genuine patriotism. Mr. Murchison stated, at the outset, that it is not necessary for one to go across the water, right in the midst of the fray, to realize the horrors that are daily and hourly being perpetrated by the enemy. He declared that the great majority of the people do not yet realize its ser to trust the military leaders and Woodrow Wilson in this great crisis. Our armies have been raised with great rapidity, he said, but nothing compared to the need of the hour. Every leading man realizes now that the United States was a little too slow in declaring war; but the fact that we had always been a peace-loving people, was largely responsible for this. It is an enormous undertaking, and the people of this country are willing iousness. The speaker declared that the ill feeling occasioned by the War Between the Sections had not yet finally passed away, and this, too; had been a draw-back, to a certain extent in getting the people aroused to a full sense of duty. Happily, however, the time has arrived when every American no longer knows no North, no South no East or no West, but that Americans everywhere are lining up with the one great purpose of making the peoples of the world free.

Dr. Murchison scored the manner in which pacifists are spreading German propaganda throughout the country. The fact that we should or should not have entered the war, said he, is as ancient as Revolutionary history, and all must act and act wisely. Men are needed faster than we can get them across the water, and these men must be cared for. They are making the supreme sacrifice, and it is the duty of those who are left behind to see to it that they are made as comfortable as possible. In this connection, the speaker urged the members of the Lexington Red Cross to put every ounce of energy into their work; that wounded soldiers in the trenches are praying for the bandages to hold out until their wounds are dressed.

The speaker closed with an eloquent and touching appeal for the thousands of little innocent children in the war-ridden sections who are without food raiment. His was a masterly presentation of the needs of the hour, and he sat down amid much applause.

The next and last speaker was Mrs. Annie I. Rembert, of Columbia, a woman who has given most of her time and her talents for many years in the great work of stamping out tuberculosis in South Carolina. Mrs. Rembert stated, however, that this was not her mission on this occasion; that she was here for the purpose of arousing the people of Lexington to a deeper sense of duty at this time—in this hour of the nation's crisis. I wish I could go out on an old time campaign and meet the people face to face everywhere," she said, "and endeavor to impress upon them the sacrifices which our soldiers are making." Mrs. Rembert declared that every soldier now in camp realizes fully that they are offering their all
