Y ORDINANCE TO FIX BUSINESS LICENSES UPON PERSONS, COR PORATIONS OR FIRMS ENGAG-ED IN ANY CALAFFG, BUSINESS OCCUPATION ON PROFESSION Ice dealers each per year \$5.00 IN THE TOWN OF LEXINGTON SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE PURPOSES OF RAISING REVE-NUE FOR THE PRIDINARY EX-PENSES OF SAID TOWN.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Lexington, in Council assembled and by authority Life Insurance Companies or Agents; of the same:
