

Any violation of the provisions of this Act shall be a misdemeanor, and upon conviction there the offender shall suffer penalty of fine of not less than ten (\$10) dollars nor more than twenty-five (\$25) dollars or imprisonment of not less than ten nor more than thirty days.

**SECTION 4.** It is unlawful to poison the streams or waters of the State in any manner whatsoever for the purpose of taking fish. The muddying of streams or ponds or the introduction of any substance which results in making the fish sick, so that they may be caught is hereby declared to be poisoning in the sense of this Act. No saw dust or acid or other injurious substance shall be discharged into any of the streams of the State where fish breed or abound. It shall be unlawful to throw, place or put any dynamite or any other explosive in any lake stream or water in the State for the purpose of taking fish. For the violation of this Section the person or persons so violating shall be fined five hundred (\$500) dollars or imprisoned not exceeding one year.

**SECTION 5.** It shall be unlawful for any transportation company to receive for shipment any of the game birds or animals of the State, except in season and unless the package containing them shall be so labeled as to show the consignor or consignee, and the number and kind of birds and animals.

**SECTION 6.** There shall be no night hunting in this State except for Raccoons and Opposum and Foxes, and the penalty for hunting Deer, with touches or artificial lights of any kind shall be not more than thirty days or one hundred (\$100) dollars fine.

**SECTION 7.** When not otherwise specified the penalty for violation of any part of the game bird or fish laws of this State shall be a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof the offender shall suffer penalty of fine of not less than ten dollars, or more than twenty-five dollars, or imprisonment of not less than ten or more than thirty days.

**SECTION 8.** It shall be the positive duty of all Sheriff, Deputes, Sheriffs, Constables, Rural Police and Special Officers to actively cooperate with the Game Department, and Game Wardens in the enforcement of the game and fish laws of the State.

**SECTION 9.** The destruction of birds nests shall be punishable in the same way as the destruction of the birds.

**SECTION 10.** It shall be unlawful for any one to hunt within this State without first procuring a license to do so from the Deputy Game Warden in the county in which he may propose to hunt or an adjoining county of the State. A resident of any County shall pay a license fee of one and 10-100 (\$1.10) dollars. A non-resident shall pay license fee to hunt in any county of three and ten one hundredths (\$3.10) dollars, except land owners and members of their families hunting or fishing on their own lands or in waters on their lands, leased by them. Every non-resident of the State shall pay a hunter's license fee of fifteen and 25-100 (\$15.25) dollars during any one season. Provided, Any employee residing in this State may fish or hunt on the lands of his employer, owning or leasing the land, by the written permission of the person so owning or leasing of his Superintendent with the same privileges as said owner or person leasing may enjoy.

**SECTION 11.** All non-residents of this State before fishing for game or other fish in any manner in the inland streams or waters of this State, shall first procure a non-resident fishing license, the fee for which shall be three and 25-100 (\$3.25) dollars.

**SECTION 12.** Provided, That the provisions of this Act shall not prevent residents of the State from hunting without license on their own lands in any county of the State.

**SECTION 13.** That the Federal Migratory Bird Treaty Regulations being the Supreme Law of the Land under Article VI of the Constitution of the United States are hereby declared to be the law of this State and the penalty for their violation shall be punishment of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$25.00 fine or thirty days imprisonment.

**SECTION 14.** This Act shall take effect immediately upon its approval by the Governor.

## NEW TOWN LICENSE

**AN ORDINANCE TO FIX BUSINESS LICENSES UPON PERSONS, CORPORATIONS, OR FIRMS ENGAGED IN ANY CALLING, BUSINESS, OCCUPATION, OR PROFESSION IN THE TOWN OF LEXINGTON SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE PURPOSES OF RAISING REVENUE FOR THE ORDINARY EXPENSES OF SAID TOWN.**

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Lexington, in Council assembled, and by authority of the same:

**SECTION 1:** That from and after the ratification of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person, or persons, firm or corporation following the trades, occupations, businesses, professions or callings enumerated in this Ordinance to do or conduct, or to transact any business connected with any said trades, occupations, businesses, professions or callings without first paying for and obtaining from the Clerk of the Town Council a license to follow said business, or profession according to the scale hereinbelow set out.

**SECTION 2:** That the license fees provided for in section three hereof shall be due and payable for the year 1919 on or before the first day of May 1919, and each succeeding year thereafter until this Ordinance shall have been repealed or revised, the said license fees shall be due and payable on or before the 15th day of March.

**SECTION 3:** That the following scale of license fees are hereby declared to be due and payable by each person, firm or corporation engaged in business or practicing a profession in the town of Lexington, payable as outlined in section two of this Ordinance.

- Attorneys at Law each, per year \$12.50
- Agents for Newspapers, fruit trees, fertilizers, pianos, organs, machinery, sewing machines, solicitors, claim and collections, and all other agents not mentioned, each per year \$10.00
- Automobile dealers each per year \$25.00
- Automobile repairers, not working in garage, each per year \$15.00
- Automobile repair shops or garages each, per year \$20.00

- Boarding Houses accepting or soliciting transient boarders, each, per year \$7.50
- Bowling Alleys each, per year \$10.00
- Blacksmith or wheelwright each, per year \$10.00
- Barber Shop, each chair, per year \$7.50
- Barber, not working in a shop, each, per year \$7.50
- Banks with a capital stock of twenty-five thousand dollars or less, each, per year \$25.00
- Banks for every thousand dollars capital in excess of twenty-five thousand \$1.00
- Bill Poster (local or itinerant), each, per year \$5.00
- Butchers and Meat Markets, each, per year \$15.00
- Bottling Plants in town of Lexington making soft drinks, each per year \$5.00
- Wagons delivering soft drinks made outside town limits, each, per year \$15.00
- Boot-blacks, each, per year \$1.00

- Cotton Mills, each \$50.00
- Contractor—contracting for brick or wooden buildings or structure of any kind, per year \$10.00
- Cotton gins and presses, each per year \$7.50
- Cotton Seed Oil Mills, each per year \$25.00
- Circus; Menagerie; or other Shows according to size and admission fee each not less than \$25.00 per week or more than \$50.00 per week.
- Cigar and Tobacco dealers alone each per year \$10.00
- Dentists; Oculist; or Opticians each per year \$12.50
- Dealers in fish and oysters; poultry; fruit and country produce, each, per year \$5.00
- Drays; wagons; or vehicles run for gain; each one horse per year \$5.00
- Drays; wagons or vehicles run for gain; each two-horse per year \$7.50

- Electric Light or Power Companies, each, per year \$20.00
- Electrical Supplies or Wiring contractor or dealer, each \$5.00
- Fruit Wagons plying streets and delivering fruit, each, per year \$50.00
- Fire Insurance Companies and Agents each per year \$5.00
- Hotels, each per year \$7.50

- Hacks; Carriages; Automobiles; or Vehicles for hire to and fro; each per year \$20.00
- Horse; Cattle or other live stock dealers; not paying for livery or sales stable; each, per year \$12.50
- Ice dealers each per year \$5.00
- (In connection with any other business exempt) If retailed; each, per year \$5.00
- Industrial Life Insurance Companies; or Agents soliciting or collecting, each per year \$5.00

- Life Insurance Companies or Agents; each per year \$7.50
- Livery; Feed and Sales Stables; each per year \$7.50
- Merchants, Drug Stores; or mercantile Companies; each according to the amount of stock carried—those carrying a stock of one thousand or less per year \$10.00
- For each additional thousand or fraction thereof \$2.00
- Moving Picture Shows Theatres or permanent exhibitions; each, per year \$15.00
- Mills; Planing; Grist or Flour; Saw; Hosiery; or Knitting; each per year \$10.00
- Machine Shops or Foundries; each, per year \$15.00
- Naval Stores; Stillers or dealers; each per year \$7.50
- Oil wagons delivering oil from wagons or auto trucks; each, per year \$25.00

- Paint Shops; Paint Contractors; each per year \$7.50
- Physicians or Doctors of Medicines, each per year \$7.50
- Photographers; each per year \$5.00
- Picture or Book Agents (non-residents) each per year \$7.50
- Peddlers, or Hawkers of wares and goods; each per year \$10.00
- Pool; Billiard or Bagatelle tables for public use, each per year \$12.50
- Pressing Clubs; each, per year \$5.00

- Restaurants or Lunch Stands; each, per year \$7.50
- Repairers of Guns; Pistol; watches; Sewing Machines; organs; Pianos; Stoves, etc. each per year \$7.50
- Real estate Agents—renting or selling—each per year \$7.50
- Soda Fountains or Retailers of bottled soft drinks each per year \$7.50
- (When in connection with mercantile business exempt)
- Slot Machines (as per restrictions) each, per year \$10.00
- Slot Machines (operating for cigars only) each per year \$5.00
- Shooting Galleries; each, per year \$10.00

- Telephone and Telegraph Companies each, per year \$15.00
- Turkey Raffles each per year \$5.00
- Warehouses or Storage rooms (Storage of Cotton, Produce or goods for the public) each per year \$15.00
- Vulcanizing Plants not operated with a Garage \$10.00

**SECTION 4:** Any person, firm or corporation failing or refusing to procure the licenses hereinbefore provided for before entering upon any business or profession within the said town, or any person, firm or corporation doing business or practicing any profession in the town of Lexington, who shall fail to procure said license on or before the dates provided for in section two hereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than (\$100) dollars or be imprisoned not more than thirty days.

**SECTION 5.** That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances heretofore passed inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

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## JOHN H. Snelgrove SHOT BY NEGRO

**Well Known Young White Farmer Severely Wounded by George Kaigler on Highway.**

John Henry Snelgrove a well known young white farmer residing about five miles west of Lexington, was severely shot by George Kaigler a negro near Dixiana Saturday night. Snelgrove was riding in a Ford car accompanied by his friend Matthew Meetez when they met Kaigler and his wife at a curve in the road driving a horse and buggy; and through some misunderstanding in giving the road they ran together; injuring Snelgrove's car and demolishing Kaigler's buggy. Snelgrove left his car and went back to ascertain the extent of the injury done, and addressing Kaigler, informed him that they would pay for the damages done to his buggy. Cranking off the car Snelgrove and Meetez drove a considerable distance down the road, when they discovered that their car was damaged and stopped to make an investigation, when it is claimed, Kaigler came up the road and opened fire on Snelgrove, with a 32 calibre pistol, firing four shots, one taking effect in the right shoulder and coming out in the upper part of the right chest. By this time some of the residents of the neighborhood had been attracted to the scene of the shooting and Kaigler seeing them, made his escape leaving his wife in the road.

It is not thought that Snelgrove is seriously injured, as the bullet did not pierce his lungs and unless complications arise no fatal results are anticipated.

Kaigler is still at large although several posse's have been scouring the country for him, and it is thought that he is still in the neighborhood and will soon be apprehended.
