He says he had a wonderful experience and would not take any thing for what he has seen, but after all Lexington is the best place. He reached home Saturday, and Monday morning went to the cotton field with his hoe to show "General Green" how he fought the Germans, and it is need less to say that it wasn't long before he had him on the run.

ARMY TRUCKS TO BUILD ROAD

War Department Turns Over to Agricultural Department 20,000 for Use of States.

Washington.—More than \$45,000,000 worth of motor trucks have been turned over to the department of agriculture by the war department and are ready to be distributed to the various state highway departments through the bureau of public roads.

The trucks, numbering about twenty thousand, and a majority of them new, are the surplus left on the hands of the war department when the war ended. They are to be distributed to the states under a provision of the post-office appropriation bill and must be used on road construction work.

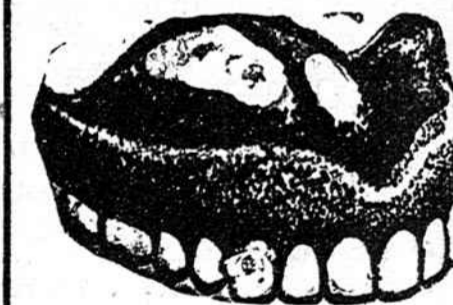
