The examination for the award of vacant scholarships in the University of South Carolina and for admission of new students will be held at the county court house, July 11, 1919 at 9 a m. Applicants must not be more than sixteen years of age. When scholarships are vacant after July 11, they will be awarded to those making the highest average at examination provided they meet the conditions governing the award. Applicants for scholarships should write to President Currell for scholarship application blanks. These blanks properly filled out by the applicant, should be filed with Dr Currell by July 7. 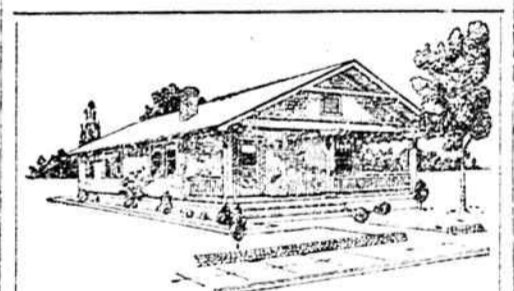
