

# DEATH OF JOHN C. CAUGHMAN

Prominent Citizen of Delmar Section Passes After Long Illness.

On Tuesday morning, October 21, 1919, Mr. Jno. C. Caughman of the Delmar section, died after about two years of lingering illness, mostly feebleness from old age. His remains were laid to rest the following morning in the churchyard at Mt. Hebron. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. D. Shealy, assisted by a former pastor, Rev. O. B. Shearouse. One of the largest crowds ever seen at Mt. Hebron attended the funeral of this gentleman, a highly respected gentleman.

Mr. Caughman was baptized and confirmed at Salem church, later transferred to St. Marks and when Mt. Hebron was organized he became a charter member of that church. To the latter he remained a faithful member until death claimed him. He served as an Elder in the church as long as his health would permit, was Superintendent of the Sunday School for many years at Mt. Hebron.

During the war between the states he served bravely and well, and won the applause of comrades and officers and lost a leg in the service of his country. He was elected and served as Treasurer of the Delmar section and after Saluda County was formed from a part of Edgefield served several years as treasurer of the latter county.

Mr. Caughman was preceded to the great beyond by his beloved wife, and two sons, George and William, and children to mourn their loss: Mesdames Mary, Jennie, Lillian, Jessie Hutchinson, Gertrude Wright, Carrie Bowers, and Messrs John and Allen Caughman. He also leaves two sisters, Mesdames Elizabeth Derrick and Joseph Allen, besides other relatives and a host of friends to mourn his departure.

Few men lived as long and as well as did Mr. Caughman. His life was long but filled with usefulness and unselfish deeds, have attained more than 76 years. He served his church as only a man of pure heart could, he served his country as only a hero could, he served his County and State as only a loyal and faithful official could, he served his family as only a true husband and loving father could, he served his community as only a

kind neighbor could. As a result of his life of usefulness he lays it down with the love, respect and admiration of ever one who knew him.—Leeville Twin-County News.

## AMERICAN RED CROSS EQUIPPED MANY HOSPITALS

Atlanta, October 20.—Emory University's base hospital, organized for war service under the name of the Emory Unit, is one of the fifty base hospitals now being held intact for future emergencies, in accordance with the wishes of the military authorities, and is a part of the peace program of the American Red Cross.

War does not necessarily take a place in what may be termed "future emergencies"—though it is a fact that every generation since the United States came into being has been marked by a war. But peace has her disasters—floods, storms, earthquakes, epidemics, great fires, and she requires swift relief work, such as can be supplied only by a well organized and equipped system of base hospitals. In all the American Red Cross equipped base hospitals at an expense of approximately \$3,000,000, with all necessary apparatus and equipment, which was donated to the government when the units were mustered into the service.

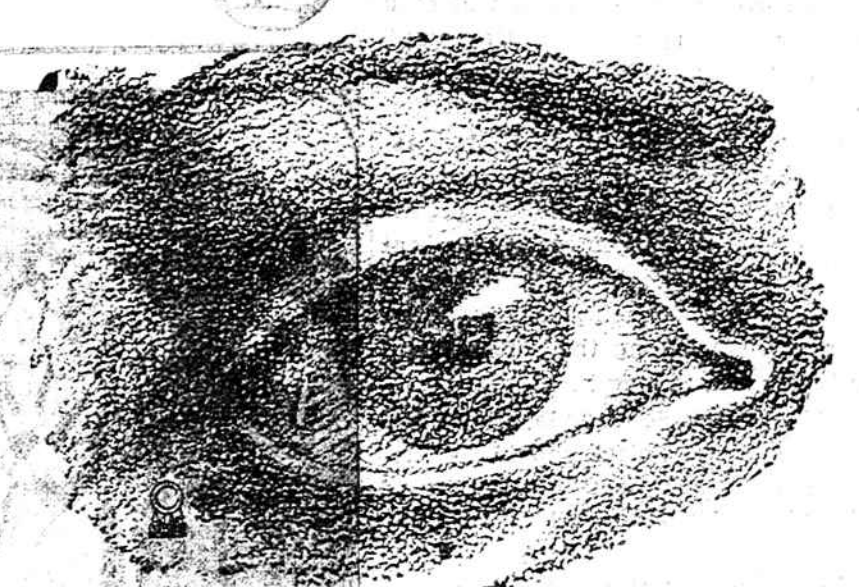
