

# DISPENSARY CASE CONSIDERED SOON

EARLY DECISION EXPECT-ED FROM UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT

SESSION OPENS MONDAY

STATE AUTHORITIES BELIEVE THAT LITIGATION WILL BE ENDED FAVORABLE TO SOUTH CAROLINA

Attorney General Lyon hopes that the United States supreme court on reconvening Monday will render a final decision in the dispensary litigation case, which has now been in the courts, both federal and State, for nearly two years. The case was argued before this final tribunal several weeks ago and at that time, from the quesions asked and from remarks made upon the bench, it was believed that

All of the counsel connected with the side of the State are exceedingly hopeful and it is believed that from the points and anthorities quoted that the right of the State to settle the affairs of the old State dispensary will be sustained.
