COLE L. BLEASE EPISCOPAL SERVICES TAKES THE OATH

YESTERDAY BECAME THE
GOVERNOR OF SOUTH
CAROLINA

THE INAUGURAL EXERCISES

HALL AND GALLERIES
CROWDED WITH VISITORS
AND WITH COLLEGE BOYS
AND GIRLS.

Columbia, Jan. 18. (Special)—

Cole L. Blease of Newberry was yesterday inducted into the office of governor of South Carolina and M F Ansel of Greenville retired, after a service of four years as governor. Chas. A. Smith of Timmonsville was sworn in as lieutenant governor, Thos. G. McLeod of Bishopville retired as lieutenant governor, after four years service.

The exercises were held in joint assembly of the senate and house in the hall of the house of representatives. The hall was crowded with pupils of the colleges and with out-of-town friends of the new governor. The exercises were simple and consisted in the taking of the oath of office by the governor-elect and the lieutenant governor-elect and the reading of the inaugural address. Gov. Blease was weak and pale and merely stated that as a result of a recent illness it would be impossible for him to deliver his inaugural address. He asked that the address be read by S. McG. Simkins of Edgefield, reading clerk of the house.

The oath of office was administered at 12:06 by T. S. Dunbar, a notary public and magistrate of Hubbard, Barnwell county. Chief Justice Ira B. Jones administered the oath of office to Mr. Smith, as lieutenant governor. The exercises were presided over by Thos. G. McLeod the retiring lieutenant governor. The reading of the inaugural address was completed at 12:45 o'clock and the joint assembly was announced dissolved.

Just at noon the sergeant-at-arms of the house John S. Wilson, announced the arrival of the senate. Following the senate came the inaugural party.

Leading the inaugural party was Cole L. Blease, accompanied by Frank B. Gary and Dr. W. S. Housal. Next came Gov. Ansel with Senator F. H. Weston of Edgefield county. Following was Mr. Smith with Senator Hough. Next came the members of the supreme court and following the entire official family of the State, including all officers. The governor-elect was led to the speaker's stand. He stood by T. S. Dunbar, who was to deliver the oath of office. He was pale and spoke almost inaudibly. He repeated the oath of office and became the governor of South Carolina. There was some cheering. He remained seated.

The exercises were opened with prayer by the Rev. J. W. Daniel, D. D., of Columbia. He asked divine guidance upon the incoming administration.

Following the inauguration and the dismissal of the joint assembly Mr. Blease returned to a local hotel. G. W. Ansel will leave Columbia to-day for his home in Greenville and after a few days spent there will go to Florida for a vacation of several weeks.

Many Newberry citizens had come down to see their fellow townsman elected as chief executive of the State, and a party of his relatives were seated upon the floor near the rostrum. Among these relatives were Mr. Blease's mother, Mrs. S. F. Blease; H. H. Blease of Staunton, Va., a brother; Eugene S. Blease, a brother of Newberry, with his lit-

COLE L. BLEASE.

Coleman Livingston Blease, son of Henry H. and Mary B. Blease, was born 41 years ago in Newberry. He attended the public schools of the town, studied at Newberry college and the University of South Carolina and was graduated from the Georgetown law school in 1881. In the latter year he was admitted to practice before the supreme court of the District of Columbia. A few days later he was enrolled as an attorney of the South Carolina supreme court and in March 1893, he was admitted to practice before the United States supreme court. He belonged to the Republican party in South Carolina politics during the early nineties, entering the lower house of the general assembly in 1890. He was made chairman of the committee on privileges and elections and twice was speaker pro tempore. He was reelected to the house in 1892 and 1898, leading the ticket each time. He suffered some losses in his public life, three times in the general assembly, and he had twice been an unsuccessful candidate for governor and twice for lieutenant governor. However, he was always popular and was city attorney, mayor and county attorney when not in the legislature. In 1896 and again in 1900 he was a presidential elector in the Democratic ticket. He served as State senator from Newberry county, being president pro tempore of the senate. As a lawyer he has been engaged in a number of murder cases, his last appearance in that role being in the Wash Ely's appeal to the United States supreme court, argued last week and the case was Miss Sumner of Newberry.
