- 4. If subscribers move to other er, and the paper is sent to the former direction, they are held responsible. Notice should always be given of removal.
- 5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take a paper or periodical from the office, or removing and leaving it oncalled for, is prima facie evidence as intentional fraud.
