The Tenure of Office of the Circuit Judges.

The News and Courier has raised an important question in reference to the term of office of Judges elected to fill out the unexpired terms of their predecessors. Judge Carpenter was elected December, 1872; Judge Cooke January, 1873; Judge Reed December, 1874, and Judge Shaw Januery, 1875-all elected to fill vacancies caused by death or resignation of office, and for the unexpired

By the constitution the circuit judges are elected for the term of four years, and it is claimed these judges hold office for four years from the time of their election. 
