THE GREAT SHOW .- Howes' Great London Circus and Menagerie. A magnificent street display, rare collection of animals, and an excellent circus performance may be expected at Orangeburg Wednesday, Ostober 27. The Memphis Avalanch says: Never, except on the celebration of Mardi Gras, has our city witnessed such a gathering of people as that which assembled on the streets yesterday to witness the advent of Howes' Great London Circus and Menagerie. Long before the hour appointed for the appearance of the grand cavalcade people began to assemble on the prinepal streets, along the proposed line of march. and when the first notes of band which headed the procession were heard, every available space which could afford a good view was occupied. Windows, balconies, awnings and sidewalks were crammed with people eager to see the street display, about the magnificence of which so much was said. That they were not disappointed was manifested by the exclamations of surprise and admiration that greeted the living panogama at every point. Unquestionably it was more beautiful than any similar street entertainment ever offered to our people, and

was but the foretaste of the inimitable performance that was seen later under the canvass. The cavalcade was many squares in length, and was composed of cavaliers, knights and ladies on horseback, Roman Chariots drawn by horses four abreast, a cage full of African hyenas, among which fearlessly sat the negro keeper, Irquois Indians dressed in their fontastic costumes, painted, and TRIAL JUSTICE AND ATTORcarrying implements of Indian warfare, the five performing elephants and a camel, a number of wagons on which were beautifully painted allegorical pictures, and containing the wild animals belonging to Sanger's English Menagerie. The striking features of the display were two magnificent chariots drawn by richly caparisoned horses. These chariots were handsomely painted and gilded. and displayed on the sides a number of mirrors, which, as they moved along, multiplied and reflected the gorgeous pageantry, producing a pleasant effect on the beholders. To attempt a minute description of the display would be almost an endless task, as each feature of it presented something entirely new and far eclipsing any circus display ever made in the South.
