ARRESTED.—C. S. Miller was arrested yesterday morning by Detective James Canton. It seems that he was offering alpacas to dealers at such extremely low figures as to arouse suspicion, and he was delayed in a store until an officer could be sent for and his arrest accomplished.

The above item is taken from the Columbia Register. If T. Kohn & Bro., were not well known, and gentlemen above suspicion, they might possibly be arrested and brought before a trial justice on a similar charge.

Pardoned.

John L. Humbert has been pardoned by the Governor, and we understand, is now at home with his family. This act of executive clemency merits the universal approbation of the citizens of this county, and although the defalcations in the treasury office during Humbert's term leave the county in debt, he is not regarded as the principal in this fraud, but as treasurer legally responsible.

The defendant was convicted at the January term, 1875, of the Court of General sessions for Orangeburg County of official misconduct as county treasurer and sentenced to imprisonment for one year in the penitentiary and a fine \$1,000.

The application being now renewed, I have re-examined the case, and I now reach the conclusion that the public interests will permit me to grant the pardon. Nearly ten months of the eleven months during which he would be confined have passed and the sheriff of Orangeburg county certifies that he has collected by levy and sale of the prisoner's property \$705.60 of the fine.

I may add that the present petitions have the names of Hon. R. B. Elliott, A. B. Knowlton, Esq., J. H. Livingston, Esq., Rev. A. Webster, Wm. A. Hayne, Esq., H. L. Shrewsbury, Esq., Hon. J. J. Wright, of the Supreme Court, Hon. H. E. Hayne, Hon. W. B. Nash, Hon. Samuel W. Melton, Attorney General, Hon. F. L. Cardozo, W. R. Jones, Esq., and others of equal prominence and weight.

Mr. Solicitor Buttz endorses the application, and his Honor Judge Reed concurs on the ground that this punishment has already accomplished the ends of justice.

Under these circumstances, I grant the pardon, remitting the remainder of the sentence, both of imprisonment and fine.

How to Get an Education.

Some of our young friends in this section are writing us to know by what means they can secure what they seem very anxious to gain—an education. Some of them are waiting for good friends to aid them. But if any one wishes to be educated, let them go to work and get it.

"The last of December, and my last week's work was finished, and I settled my account with my old master. I had earned the money, and he brought out my indentures, and put them into my hands. I was free! But I declined, and asked him to retain them, which he finally consented to do.

And now for Kent's Hill. To me it seemed the original Eden. I commenced my preparation. It may strike the reader as strange, but I could get no money for my labor, nothing but store pay, as it was called. And thus commenced my all too brief student life. None of the "faculty" of that grand old school, which has sent out into active life so many hundreds of laborers, are now alive, and but few of the students who were filling the classes at that time.
