The road tax of one donar can be paid the County Treasurer from Oct. 15th, 1904, to March 1st, 1905. All male persons living within cor-porate limits of cities or towns, stud-ents attending any college or school of the state, Ministers in charge of reguthe state, Ministers in charge of regu-lar congregations, teachers employed in public schools, school trustees dur-ing their term of office, persons per-manently disabled and those actually engaged in the quarantine service of the state are exempt from the pay-ment of road tax. All other male per-sons betweet the ages of 15 and 50 Years are required to pay said road tax

furnished upon application. No lists of names for tax receipts will be received unless the amount of

tax money is deposited with the said list. This rule will be strictly enforced, W, R. HOUGH,
