Death of Ex-Governor Hugh S. Thompson.

Ex-Governor Hugh S. Thompson died in New York on the 20th, inst., and his remains were interred at Columbia on yesterday. In the early days of our rescue from seafaring and carpentering, Mr. Thompson was a prominent figure in State politics, and from 1882 to 1884 filled the office of Governor to the general satisfaction of all the people. He was a genial, kindly gentleman and we regret to learn of his death. *Requiescat in pace.*

On Friday night, the 18th inst., the soul of Mr. Thomas J.
