Oh friends! The world will never be better as long as men's hearts are callous to the suffering of the dumb servants given into our keeping. There is no surer way to make it better than to make its great heart tender to suffering in any form, and one of the first steps towards this end is to make the rawhide an object of aversion, instead of putting its miniature copy in the hands of children.

There are great firms today, owning hundreds of horses and mules, whose drivers are never permitted to have a whip. To be seen with one would cost the driver his position. These horses perform their work with a steadiness and intelligence delightful to behold, and in pleasing contrast to the useless plunging and spasmodic straining of a willing team made nervous, restless, frantic by incessant yells and "the crack of the whip."

TAX NOTICE.

Office of Treasurer of Kershaw County, }
Camden, S. C., Sept. 15, 1904. }

In accordance with the act to raise supplies for the fiscal year commencing Jan. 1st 1905, notice is hereby given that the books will be open for collecting state, county and school taxes from October 15, 1904, to March 1st, 1905. A penalty of 1 per cent. will be added on all taxes unpaid by Jan. 1st, 1905. A penalty of 2 per cent. on all unpaid by February 1st, 1905. A penalty of 7 per cent will be added on all unpaid by March 1st, 1905.

The rate per centum for Kershaw county is as follows:

The road tax of one dollar can be paid the County Treasurer from Oct. 15th, 1904, to March 1st, 1905.

All male persons living within corporate limits of cities or towns, students attending any college or school of the state, Ministers in charge of regular congregations, teachers employed in public schools, school trustees during their term of office, persons permanently disabled and those actually engaged in the quarantine service of the state are exempt from the payment of road tax. All other male persons between the ages of 18 and 60 years are required to pay said road tax or work not less than eight days during the year.

The poll tax is \$1. All information as to taxes will be furnished upon application.

No lists of names for tax receipts will be received unless the amount of tax money is deposited with the said list.

This rule will be strictly enforced.
