### THE POPULAR VOTE.

#### Number Received by the Two Presidential Candidates in 1904.

To the Editor of The State: Will you please give me the total popular vote for president in 1904 election.

(According to a canvass made by the New York Times, complete except as to one county in Tennessee and four counties in Michigan, the total popular vote in the late election was 13,533,820. Of this, Parker received 5,094,091, while Roosevelt polled 7,640,565, the largest popular vote ever given to a candidate for President of the United States. Roosevelt's plurality was 2,546,470. The remainder of the popular vote was scattered among the several minor candidates. In the electoral college Parker will receive 140 votes; Roosevelt, 336.—Editor The State.)

#### Aaron Williams Given a Second Respite.

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 14.—(Special.)—The governor today again respited Aaron Williams, the negro sentenced to hang at Camden on the 4th of November for criminally assaulting a Mrs. Langley, whose husband shortly after the negro's arrest, committed suicide. On the ground of after discovered evidence the negro was respited to the 23rd of December in order to allow those interested in the case to move for a new trial, but the solicitor declined to ask for a special day's session of the sessions court, and the respite is continued until March, when the motion will be made before the regular term of the criminal court.

## TAX NOTICE.

Office of Treasurer of Kershaw County, Camden, S. C., Sept. 15, 1904.

In accordance with the act to raise supplies for the fiscal year commencing Jan. 1st 1905, notice is hereby given that the books will be open for collecting state, county and school taxes from October 15, 1904, to March 1st, 1905. A penalty of 1 per cent. will be added on all taxes unpaid by Jan. 1st, 1905. A penalty of 2 per cent. on all unpaid by February 1st, 1905. A penalty of 7 per cent will be added on all unpaid by March 1st, 1905.

The road tax of one dollar can be paid the County Treasurer from Oct. 15th, 1904, to March 1st, 1905.

All male persons living within corporate limits of cities or towns, students attending any college or school of the state, Ministers in charge of regular congregations, teachers employed in public schools, school trustees during their term of office, persons permanently disabled and those actually engaged in the quarantine service of the state are exempt from the payment of road tax. All other male persons between the ages of 18 and 50 years are required to pay said road tax or work not less than eight days during the year.

The poll tax is \$1. All information as to taxes will be furnished upon application.

No lists of names for tax receipts will be received unless the amount of tax money is deposited with the said list.

This rule will be strictly enforced. W. R. HOUGH, County Treas.
