It is found they differ in opinion Some desire saws of larger diameter than others. The nost common size is 9 or 10 inches; but some wish them 12 inches Some wish 5 or 6 rows of brushes on an axle, while others do not want more than 4 at most. Some wish saws with 8 or 9 teeth to the inch. while otters want 10 or 11. With so much discrepancy, we prefer they should, at the time of giving orders, turnish a statement of their wishes,
