SYNOPSIS VIEWS EXPRESSED AT BLENHEIM

Want to Leave Lien Law to Vote of the People, and favor Prohibition

Thos. A. Bristow told some jokes about the present members of the legislature. He favored letting the people vote on the lien law. Against the sale of pistols and cartridges. Opposed to homestead law. Opposed to allowing people to pay out when convicted of crime. They should be put in chain-gang. The blind tigers have the best law in the county, because good men do not report them.

J. P. Bunch said he did not expect to be a candidate till a few days ago. Said his gray head and beard admonished him that his time was short. Non-professional man from ordinary walks of life, here by request of men of my calling. In favor of biennial sessions of the legislature. The state government is becoming extravagant cut off one session a year and save from \$60,000 to \$85,000. Legislature of which I was a member passed amendment for biennial sessions, but it was never submitted to the people.

Opposed to bureau of immigration. Will fight it for all I am worth. Favor liberal support for higher institutions of learning.

J. C. Campbell said two years ago the absorbing issue was liquor. It was not an issue between liquor and prohibition. The issue was

repeal lien law, and thought it unwise to vote for repeal. In that matter, as all others, I want to act for the best interest of the people. Want the people to vote on lien law and instruct the representatives.

D. D. McColl Jr. said he asked for re-election on his record. Impossible in time allotted to discuss all matters of legislation. One of the acute questions is that old one of taxation. There must be taxes to run the government. What you have a right to expect is the least expenditure consistent with good government. Appropriations have increased because sum for confederate veterans has been increased from \$50,000, to \$250,000. I voted for that increase. Was it extravagant to provide for these old soldiers? For insane asylum over \$200,000 was given. We were also asked to provide for deaf and dumb at Cedar Springs, and we did it.

I voted against the following appropriations: \$25,000 for improving state house grounds; \$25,000 for Jamestown exposition. We are spending \$15,000 or \$16,000 for bureau of immigration. After the experiment had been tried I voted to abolish that department. Voted against increase of \$10,000 or \$15,000 for pay of circuit judges. Have voted against all appropriations except those which required every patriotic son to support.

In regard to the liquor question, the state is in worse situation than ever. Will discuss lien law at another meeting. Let the people who are most interested cast the deciding vote. Doubtful about expediency of repeal of law, but am servant of people, and will try

J. P. Gibson said he came in part to give an account of stewardship. Not one single bill which I have introduced has died upon the calendar. Introduced and had passed the bill to abolish bucket shops, and drove them out of the state.

Introduced and had passed bill to prevent liquor drinking on trains. Favor of the labor contract law and was instrumental in having it passed. Had state line surveyed which gained for the state about a thousand acres of land. The line is now permanently marked. Introduced bill to increase supervisor's salary from \$700 to \$900, and then to \$1000. Also had bill passed to establish school book depositories throughout the county for the benefit of patrons.

MUST FILE STATEMENTS

Expense Account Act, Published by Order of County Executive Committee.

Headquarters of the State Democratic Executive Committee, Columbia, S. C., June 4th, 1908.

To the County Chairmen of the Democratic Party of South Carolina:

Gentlemen: You will please call the attention of all candidates in the Democratic primary in your County the following act of the Legislature, approved March 6, 1905, and make it your personal business to see that every candidate files a pledge with the clerk of court of your county as required by said act:

AN ACT Making Certain Offences in Primary Elections Misdemeanors, and Prescribing Penalties Therefor.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of South Carolina: At and before every political primary election held by any political party, organization or association, for the purpose of choosing candidates for office, or the election of delegates to conventions, in this State, any person who shall by threats or any other form of intimidation, or by the payment, delivery or promise of money, or other article of value procure or offer, promise or endeavor to procure, another to vote for or against any particular candidate in such election, or who shall, for such consideration, offering to so vote, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Sec. 2. Every candidate offer-

hereby pledge that I will not give nor spend money, or use intoxicating liquors for the purpose of obtaining or influencing votes, and that I shall, at the conclusion of the campaign and before the primary election, render to the Clerk of Court or (Secretary of State as hereinbefore provided) under oath, an itemized statement of all moneys spent or provided by me during the campaign for campaign purposes up to that time, and I further pledge that I will, immediately after the primary election or elections that I am a candidate in, render an itemized statement, under oath, showing all further moneys spent or provided by me in said election: Provided, That a failure to comply with this provision shall render such election null and void, in so far as the candidate who fails to file the statement herein required, but shall not affect the validity of the election of any candidate complying with this Section: And provided further, That such itemized statement and pledge shall be open to public inspection at all times.

Sec. 3. That any violation of the provisions of this Act shall be a misdemeanor; and any person upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or be imprisoned at hard labor for not less than one month nor more than six months, or both fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

Approved the 6th day of March, A. D. 1905.
