#### CIRCULAR TO TAX COLLECTORS.

OFFICE OF THE COMPTROLLAR GEN. CHARLESTON, S. C., March 25, 1801.

Various interrogatories sudressed to this Department in relation to Taxon birted by Act 1861, having been referred to the Actor-ney-General, the following communication was received in reply. In constraing the Act, Tax Collectors throughout the State will he governed by the enistion of the Attorney-General, as published herewith. Attention is also called to the "Additional Directions" appended hereto.

# OFFICE OF THE ATTORSEY-GONL,

To W. J. Laval, Esq., Acting Comptroller Clear Sin: Your nate of the 18th, specived yes-terday, propers some questions in negard to which I find it difficult to come lo any satisfactory conclusion. - Much, after all, in the matter of tax returns, depends on the discretion and conscience of the tax-payers,

1. "Salaries" apply, "I think, to fixed amounts received annually, or at shorter periods, for services, other than menist or merely manual. We speak of the sungest of Coachman and Ditchers, although engaged by the year, and paid quarterly; and of the "nalaries" of a Public Officer, & Clerk or Schoolmaster. Overseers generally receive wager; but, when a man overlinks, perhaps, three or four plantations, and receives several thousand-dollars, the compensation would rise to the dignity of a salary. I would take an Overseer's return either way as he chose to make it. All compensation for work not coming under the head of salary would be "mages." Saluries aretax@ble, however small, and for the whole amount. Wages are taxable only when they exceed \$500 a year, and then, in my opinion, only on the excess over that amount. Both salary and wages are compensation for the tax-payer's own services.

2. The salaries of fiscal offices are not exempt from tax, nor the salaries of say other officers than these of the Army and Navy.

3. Wages of journeymen mechanics, I think, are 'exempt, under the exception you

3. A Tax Collector's commissions, if not salary, would, in its widest sense, come under the head of "wages," or might be embraced under the head of "employment." The Legirlature meant that all persons, not specially excepted, should contribute something from their carnings; and public officers are spocially included. Though not, in the ordinary sense, salary, I think that Tax Collectors' income would be most appropiately returned under that head.

5. Notes and obligations given for PRO-PERTY SOLD, WHETHER MERCHANDISE OR OTHERWISE, If ON TIME or BEAR-ING INTEREST, would, I think, be liable to taxation, as money at interest. Notes given for merchandise usually have the interest incorporated in the amount, and this I should coning them, and not an evasion ;

#### in some sort an investment.

6. Funds not reduced to possession, and from which no present income is derived, are not within the provisions of the Act, and such | Rhodes containing 200 acres more or less, as is the situation generally of amounts in the his property, at the suit of Hayard Faulk and hands of Masters and Commissioners. The persons to whom it shall be untimely decided that these funds belong are not liable to a tax.

7. Professional income I consider as the amount which the professional man recieves after the expenses necessarily incident to the exercise of his profession have been deducted. #### TAX COLLECTORS. Returns of "moneys loaned" and "moneys

at interest," investments in stock and bonds, &c., are to be made with reference to the year ending, 31st December, 1860, and must be for the principal so invested:

ADDITIONAL DIRECTIONS TO

The exemeption of the "Bonds and Stock of this State," from the tax of 10 cents per \$100 on "Moneys invested in Stocks, &c.," refers exclusively to the Bonds and Stocks "issued BY" the State of South Carolina.

Investments in the Stocks only of the Banks and Railroad Companies of this State, are exempt from tax; the Bonds of such Banks and Corporations are not included in this ex-

In the case of Slaves or Lands sold on 1st October, the seller and not the purchaser is liable for the tax; the law does not consider fractions of a day.
