North Carolina has furnished 5,200 approved muskets to Virginia.

The storm of Monday night, became a perfect tornado in some parts of the State, and much damage has been done by it in some sections.

The sessions of the Southern Congress are mostly secret. Nothing new from Fort Pickens.

Col. Van Dorn has captured 100 U. S. troops, in Texas.

Lieut. J. N. Moffit has resigned and will serve in the Southern Army or Navy.

Judge Campbell of the U. S. Supreme Court has resigned.

The Governors of Ohio, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana and Illinois, have met at Cleveland Ohio, for conference.

Troops are still arriving at Washington and at Annapolis. Fort Mifflin has been still further reinforced.

A million boxes of percussion caps, intended for Charleston, were seized at New York on Friday last.

The Bay Line between Baltimore and Norfolk has been re-opened.

A British vessel, the Miwatha, from Liverpool, made its way into the harbor of Norfolk, on the 4th instant, notwithstanding the blockading squadron.

The Southern Congress has passed an act authorizing the organization of a regiment of Zouaves.

Better than the Best News.

A South Carolinian in Philadelphia.

W. C. Inglis, Esq., of Cheraw, who was in Philadelphia recently, for the purpose of having an operation performed on the eyes of one of his children, narrowly escaped with his life. The Cheraw Gazette speaks as follows of the affair:

"While the city was in the hands of an unprincipled mob, a newspaper, claiming respectability, announced to the mob that the clerk of the South Carolina Secession Convention and the mover of the Secession Ordinance in that Convention, was at a relative's house, in the Tenth Ward. The mob needed no better incentive to violence than this, and for the intervention of the Mayor and his police, and personal friends, not the mover of the Secession Ordinance, but a relative of his, would have fallen a sacrifice to mob violence. Warned by the Mayor of his danger, W. Cooper Inglis, the son of the mover of the Secession Ordinance, left Philadelphia with friend, by stealth, for New York, where they registered with fictitious names. But next morning they were spotted by the New York Tribune, and were only saved from violence by the intervention of friends and the police, who warned them to flee also from that city. Such are the scenes daily enacted in these civilized and christianized English-investing cities."

By way of comment, the Gazette relates the following incident:

"On Friday night last, a gentleman came to our town and registered himself on the hotel known as 'D. F. Murphy, from Boston, Massachusetts.' On Saturday morning, he was seized upon by three respectable citizens, and that, in consequence of the present war, he was not known who he was, and was committed to the jail."

of his own accord, addressed the crowd, who listened respectfully to what he had to say. He then proceeded with the gentlemen and made his statement; whereupon he was consciously informed that he could not main unscathed until he had completed his business. Not a harsh or angry word was uttered against him, and he remained in town till Monday morning, feeling as secure, not only from violence, but from annoyance, as if he had been at home. And this, too, at the very moment when the indignation of our citizens was aroused to the highest pitch by the treatment one of our citizens had received in two Northern cities. We have noted these things by way of contrast. But let not the Northern people despise themselves. Their outrages upon our citizens will surely be avenged, and that ten-fold. Our people have not been educated to vengeance, but Northern teachers will find apt scholars. Mark our prediction."

THE CATHOLICS AND THE NATIONAL TROOPERS.—A tribute of warm commendation is due to the Catholic Church throughout the United States for the entire abstinence of its clergy from all intermeddling, either one way or the other, with the national troubles. Protestants as we are, we feel bound to acknowledge and to commend the manner in which they have always held themselves aloof from the anti-slavery agitation, and in which, during the present troublous times, they have neither taken sides in the North with the North, nor in the South with the South, but have confined themselves to the appropriate duties of a kindred which is one of this world.—Richmond Dispatch.
