#### The St Louis Massacre.

The particulars of the collision between the U. S. volunteers and the citizens of St. Louis, are thus telegraphed to the Northern press. Sr Louis, May 12 .- The city was the scene of another tragedy last night. About 6 o'clock a large body of Home Guards entered the city through Fifth street, from the arsenal, where they had been enlisted during the day and furnished with arms. On reaching Walnut street the troops turned westward, & large crowd lining the pavement to witness their progress. At the corner of Fifth street parties among the speciators began hooting hissing and otherwise abusing the companies as they passed, and a boy about 14 years old discharged a pistol into their ranks. 




