in November next, for President and Vice President of the Confederate States,

which officers are to be inaugurated on the twenty second of February next, and WHEREAS the existing law of the State provides that the Electors for President and Vice President shall be appointed by the Legislature, and whereas, the Legislature of this State will not be in regular session at the time prescribed by the aforesaid Act, for appointment of Electors.

Therefore, be it known that I. F. W. PICKENS, Governor in and over the State of South Carolina, by virtue of the power in me vested by the Constitution, authorizing the Governor, on extraordinar occasions, to convene the General Assembly do issue this my PROCLAMATION calling. upon and requesting the Senators and mem-bers of the House of Representatives to convene in Columbia on the first Monday in November next ensuing, that they may be present in the House of Representatives on he said first Wednesday in November to appoint Electors of President and Vice President of the Confederate States of America, in conformity with the Act of the Confederate Congress aforesaid.

As the permanent Government is to be organized, an election will be required for two Senators from this State, and also, in all probability, considering the peculiar State of the country, other important matters will be acted on at the same session of the Legisla-Given under my hand and the scal of the
