FRANKFORT, Ky., Sept. 15.—Gov. Magoffin has issued the following Proclamation, in accordance with the resolution of the Legislature, ordering off the Confederate forces:

"In obedience to the subjoined resolution adopted by the General Assembly of Kentucky, the Government of the Confederate States and the State of Tennessee, and all others concerned, are hereby informed that Kentucky expects the Confederate or Tennessee troops to be withdrawn from her soil unconditionally.

(Signed) B. MAGOFFIN " Reliable intelligence received at Richmond, confirms the reports of the victories gained by our troops under Gen's. Floyd and Wise. Our loss is very slight. Success still attends our armies in Missouri. Gen's. Rains, Price, Hardee, and Green are driving the enemy before them.

BATTLE IN WESTERN VIRGINIA—THE FEDERAL ACCOUNT

CLARKSBURG, Va., Sept. 13.—A battle occurred at three o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, near Summersville. Gen. Rosencranz, after making a reconnaissance, found Gen. Floyd with an army of 5,000, with 16 field pieces, entrenched in a position, on the top of a mountain on the West side of the Gauley river. Pursuance of a General Order, received this day from the General of the 8th Brigade, all Captains or officers in command of Heat Companies, are hereby ordered, forthwith to cause a full and accurate list of all persons liable to Militia duty and also of all Militia men, to be made out and transmitted to the Colonel commanding. Said list will specify names and ages. Captains or officers in command will also report the amount, kind, and state of efficiency of all arms and ammunition, camp or garrison equipage, and accoutrements of any kind in possession of their men, and also what vacancies there may be in the commissioned officers in their respective corps, that orders may be issued to fill the same by election. Membership in "Home Guards" will not exempt from Militia duty persons who are otherwise liable, unless such Companies are reported as "Volunteer corps" to the Colonel commanding, and are accepted as such by the Governor. State of South Carolina. EXECUTIVE OFFICE, Columbia, September 3, 1861. To the Managers of Elections. ISSUING WRITS RECENTLY TO THE effect of holding Elections, the fact was discovered that the Constitution which extracts are quoted below, and but one day was allowed for holding the polls, instead of two, as formerly; Managers of Elections will therefore take notice, and hold the election for one day only, and count and return the votes as required by law.

It will be seen that the acts below are intended to regulate our State election, but the Constitution of the Confederate States gives Congress the power, if they think proper, to establish a uniform day in the States for holding the elections of Members of Congress, and the Act of Congress, fixing the first Wednesday in October next, says that the election is to be conducted according to the forms established by each State. 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An extract from an Act to alter and amend the tenth section of the first article of the Constitution of the State of South Carolina. "Senators and Members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen on the THIRDS DAY AFTER THE SECOND MONDAY IN OCTOBER, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and on the same day in every second year thereafter, in such manner and at such times as are herein directed." &c.

Extract from an Act to alter and amend the law in relation to the method of counting votes in all elections by the people. "That hereafter, in all elections by the people, the managers shall proceed to count the votes publicly, immediately after the final closing of the polls at the precinct where the votes have been taken, make out a certificate of the result, which shall be signed by the Managers, or a majority of them, and taken to the Court House, or place now fixed by law for counting the votes, on the day next subsequent to the day of the said election, on or before the hour of four o'clock, P. M., by one or more of the said Managers." &c.

PROCLAMATION.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. JULY 6, 1861. ACCORDING to an Act of the Confederate States Congress, entitled "An Act to put into operation the Government under the permanent Constitution of the Confederate States of America," it is required that in November next, for President and Vice President of the Confederate States, which officers are to be inaugurated on the twenty second of February next, and WHEREAS the existing law of the State provides that the Electors for President and Vice President shall be appointed by the Legislature, and whereas, the Legislature of this State will not be in regular session at the time prescribed by the aforesaid Act, for appointment of Electors.

Therefore, be it known that I, F. W. PICKENS, Governor in and over the State of South Carolina, by virtue of the power in me vested by the Constitution, and in pursuance of the Act of the Confederate States Congress, do hereby call upon and request the Senators and members of the House of Representatives to convene in Columbia on the first Monday in November next ensuing, that they may be present in the House of Representatives on the said first Wednesday in November to appoint Electors of President and Vice President of the Confederate States of America, in conformity with the Act of the Confederate Congress aforesaid.

As the permanent Government is to be organized, an election will be required for two Senators from this State, and also, in all probability, considering the peculiar state of the country, other important matters will be acted on at the same session of the Legislature.

Given under my hand and the seal of the State aforesaid, at Columbia, this sixth day of July, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and in the eighth year of the Independence of the State of South Carolina. F. W. PICKENS, Secretary of State. July 18 20 26m8t
