

"That hereafter, in all elections by the people, the managers shall proceed to count the votes publicly, immediately after the final closing of the polls at the precinct where the votes have been taken, make out a certificate of the result, which shall be signed by the Managers, or a majority of them, and taken Aullets for Sale.
